Educational Equity

We will achieve educational equity when all students have the resources to graduate ready to succeed as fully engaged citizens of the world.

Even as institutionalized barriers and inequitable funding persist, we continue to expand equity, increase opportunity, and create national best practices so that all children can recognize and reach their full potential.

2017 ACHIEVEMENTS

- All students and their families were informed about opportunities for Advanced Placement classes and options for high school, including neighborhood, charter, competitive admission, and career and technical education.
- All high school students were given free access to PSAT/SAT practice tests and individualized college-prep tools.
- All K-2 students' attendance and learning were further supported by ending school suspensions.
- All 2nd graders were tested for gifted potential, using more culturally-competent tools.



For the third year in a row, Philadelphia's public school graduation rate has continued to increase. Now, we're focused on accelerating this trend.





To make sure all students can graduate ready for college or a career, we instituted 9th grade academies in all of our high schools. Academies welcome students to high school and provide individualized support to plan and track their successful path to graduation.

Ensuring Success in High School

As high school freshmen, students meet new classmates, adjust to new teachers, and face new academic expectations.

To support successful transitions to high school, all 9th grade students can participate in Outward Bound to build friendships and experiences that show them how to trust themselves and one another.

For the rest of the year, the Outward Bound students are more confident, more ready to learn, and more excited to conquer challenges that lie ahead.

ANCHOR GOAL 2

100% of 8-year-olds will read on or above grade level.

In the first year of full implementation of our early literacy plan, the percentage of 3rd graders reading on grade level increased by five points, surpassing statewide gains.

Three years ago, Philadelphia committed to ensuring every student is reading on or above grade level by age 8. We're delivering by providing all K-3 students with the highest-quality literacy instruction and the right books in their classrooms.

Improving the Lowest Performing Schools

My colleagues and I are compelled by a moral imperative to show our students every day how a good education can make all the difference.

For us, this starts with a deep belief that all our students can and will succeed. This growth-mindset approach informs everything we do. We are constantly gathering and applying data to focus our energy where it will make the biggest impact for our students and community.

We've created a single school culture where students and teachers are learning and growing together. I believe every school, every teacher, and every student in our city shares this potential for success.
