Overview of the Quarterly School Manager Report

The Quarterly School Manager Report is a summary report on the finances and management of the School District of Philadelphia. It is prepared by the Office of Finance.

The purpose of the Quarterly School Manager Report is to provide senior management of the School District of Philadelphia with a summary of the District's progress in implementing the financial and management goals of the current fiscal year on both a "Year-to-date Actual" basis and on a "Forecast for Full Year" basis.

While the Quarterly School Manager Report focuses narrowly on the financial management of the District, it is important to keep in mind the real educational impacts to children and families of the District's financial status. Many schools lack a full array of resources and educational opportunities. Our financial plans are only effective to the extent that they provide for an adequate education of all public school children in Philadelphia.

The Quarterly School Manager Report contains the following reports and schedules:

Operating Funds: The Quarterly School Manager Report presents a combined presentation of revenues and expenses for the principal operating funds, in addition to detailed revenue categories in the general, intermediate unit, and debt service funds; and expenditure and current budget information divided according to the District's functional hierarchy.

The principal operating funds of the District consist of a General Fund, Intermediate Unit (IU) Fund, and a Debt Service Fund. The District is required, as a result of its covenants to holders of fixed rate bonds of the School District, to deposit funds into its sinking funds during the current fiscal year to pay some of the debt service due in the next fiscal year.

For all quarters except the fourth quarter, the operating reports present quarterly year-to-date actuals for the current fiscal year and prior two fiscal years; the current full year projection and full year actuals or latest projection for the prior two years; and the year-to-date actuals as a percentage of the total year. The fourth quarter report presents the current year amended budget, current full year projection, the current year projected budget variance, and full year obligations for the prior two years.

Cash Flow: The Cash Flow section includes year-to-date cash flow and vendor payment information. The School District's adopted cash flow is based on the current fiscal year's adopted budget. The cash flow projections are updated to reflect actual year-to-date results and changes to assumptions as to the timing of revenues and the payment of expense which are made as a result of actual events. The vendor payments report includes the cash payments made to date in the fiscal year to the District's vendors. The list contains payments inclusive of operating and grants expenditures.

For the Period Ended March 31, 2020

Personnel Reports: The Position Summary Report contains budgeted and projected Full Time Equivalent positions and current On-Board actual employees. Budgeted and projected positions are derived from the Office of Management and Budget personnel projection system reconciled to the Staffing Management System for school-based positions. Current On-Board employees are taken from the District's Advantage HR Staffing system and include On-Board employees at months-end with status codes 1 (Active), 2 (Acting), 3 (Long-Term Substitutes), and other codes for certain employee groups. There may be instances when the Count (Filled column) is fractional which represents an employee in a part-time position. The Quarterly School Manager Report also includes a Vacancy Report which is a listing of teacher vacancies by school for operating and grant funds.

The Position Report and Vacancy Report may vary due to timing differences, different definitions of what constitutes a vacancy, and different definitions of when a vacancy is considered filled.

Supplementary Materials: This section of the Quarterly School Manager Report contains additional materials related to the operations of the School District.

The Debt Service Schedule is the District's current fiscal year projected operating debt service budget (net of refunding), which depicts each bond series outstanding broken down by principal and interest due in the current fiscal year. "Trapped funds¹" reserved or released in the current year are shown separately.

The Capital Projects reports include a listing of the District's activities related to capital projects, in addition to detailing the monthly year-to-date cash balances for all bond funds held to pay capital projects.

The documentation also includes information regarding the school allocation methodology, major grants funds and corresponding descriptions, school-by-school Title I budgets and spend, a summary of minority and women business enterprise participation, and a listing of the data posted on the District's website as part of the Open Data Initiative.

¹ In order to be compliant with Local Government Unit Debt Act (LGUDA) guidelines that all debt be amortized, bonds with a bullet maturity must have debt service payments set aside to pay the future principal and interest when it comes due as if there were an amortization schedule. Those funds that are set aside are considered trapped and are released when the payment is due.

Introduction

Overview

The School District of Philadelphia's Quarterly School Manager Report for the period ended March 31, 2020 represents forward-looking statements and any such statements are subject to a variety of risks and uncertainties that could cause actual results to differ materially from those that have been projected. The risks and uncertainties are also heightened given the current COVID-19 pandemic, as the full economic effects of the COVID-19 pandemic have yet to be determined.

For FY20, excluding refunding, the District currently projects operating revenues of \$3,270.0 million and operating expenditures of \$3,311.9, resulting in an operating deficit of (\$41.9) million excluding changes in reserves and an operating deficit of (\$82.1) million including changes in reserves and the net impact of refunding². The District projects to end FY20 with a \$140.6 million positive ending fund balance.

This represents a (\$11.3) million decrease from the FY20 Adopted operating ending fund balance of \$151.9 million. This decrease is attributable to projected reductions in total revenue, due primarily to reduced tax revenue associated with the economic impacts of COVID-19, and a reduction in the State subsidy related to the shift of the Ready to Learn back to a grant. These revenue reductions are largely offset by a reduction to total expenditures due to COVID-19 and the corresponding shift of the Ready to Learn expenditures to grants. Additionally, fund balance is impacted by the District's plan to reserve funds in FY20 for future facilities needs.

Third Quarter Report Revised Projections

The District's third quarter projected year-end fund balance of \$140.6 million represents a (\$30.7) million decrease from the December 31, 2019 projection and is due primarily to the following changes: a (\$50.1) million decrease in FY20 projected revenues, a (\$44.4) million decrease in FY20 projected expenditures, and a (\$25.0) million reserve for facilities. Adjustments include:

Revised FY20 projected revenues:

- Reduced tax revenues are comprised of a (\$30.8) million decrease in Business Use and Occupancy Tax, a (\$23.2) million decrease in Liquor Sales Tax, and a (\$12.8) million decrease in Real Estate Tax based on revised projections from the City, minimally offset by a projected increase of \$0.4 million in Ridesharing Revenue;
- Increase in Local Non Tax revenue comprised of a \$3.6 million increase in Basis Swap and Interest earnings, offset by a (\$1.1) million net decrease in all other Local Non Tax Revenue;

² Transfers from Reserves are not included in the total expenditures. FY20 transfers from reserves are an unfavorable net (\$13.3) million for trapped funds related to debt service. Net refunding impact is not included in total expenditures. FY20 net refunding impact is an unfavorable (\$1.9) million.

- \$13.9 million increase in State Revenue, primarily due to a \$13.3 million increase in projected reimbursement from PlanCon and a \$3.1 million favorable reduction in Prior Year Intermediate Unit Advances; slightly offset by a (\$3.1) million net decrease in transportation reimbursements;
- o (\$0.06) million decrease in Federal revenue.

• Revised FY20 projected expenditures:

- Within District Operated Schools, current projections estimate a (\$28.4) million decrease primarily due to savings from school closures related to the COVID-19 pandemic, partially offset by other expenditure increases to support needs associated with the pandemic. These include: a (\$13.9) million decrease in Transportation expenditures, a (\$9.4) million decrease in direct school expenses, an (\$8.9) million decrease in Substitute Services, a (\$6.5) million decrease in Utilities, and a net (\$3.4) million reduction from savings in all other areas; partially offset by a \$8.2 million increase in Educational Technology expenditures associated with the provision of Chromebooks and other technology needs to enable distance learning, and a \$5.5 million increase in facilities and capital expenditures for additional overtime, maintenance contracts, and environmental work;
- The District projects reduced expenditures in Non-District Operated Schools of: (\$4.0) million in projected Charter School expenditures, (\$4.7) million in projected Charter Transportation costs, and (\$3.4) million in projected Transportation costs for students in Non-District Operated Schools;
- Undistributed Budgetary Adjustments and Administration expenses are projected to decrease by (\$4.1) million, consisting of a (\$3.7) million reduction in Undistributed Budgetary Adjustments and a (\$0.4) million reduction in Administration expenditures;
- o Other Financing uses are projected to increase by \$0.2 million.

Year Over Year Comparison

Revenues – Year over Year

The following table shows a year over year comparison of year-to-date revenues from FY18 to FY20.

Year-to-date revenue variances are primarily driven by the following:

- FY20 year-to-date local tax revenue as compared to FY19 is \$30.2 million higher due to a \$34.3 million increase in Real Estate Tax, Liquor Sales Tax, Use and Occupancy Tax, Sales Tax, Ridesharing Revenue, and Payments in Lieu of Taxes, partially offset by a (\$4.1) million decrease in Cigarette Tax, School Income Tax, and Public Utility Realty Tax collections. FY 2019 year-to-date local tax revenue as compared to FY 2018 is \$63.6 million higher due primarily to a \$61.9 million increase in Real Estate Tax, in addition to a net \$1.7 million increase in all other taxes.
- Local Non Tax year-to-date revenue in FY20 and FY19 is higher than FY18. This is primarily due to the City making a quarterly payment to the District as part of an increase in the City grant. Prior to FY19, these payments were not made quarterly and were received later in the year. FY20 year-to-date Local Non Tax revenue is greater than FY19 year-to-date revenue by \$32.3 million, due primarily to an increase in the City grant of \$31.2 million. In addition to an increase due to the City grant, FY19 year-to-date Local Non Tax revenue also includes \$4.7 million in increased interest and investment earnings as compared to FY18.
- FY20 year-to-date State revenues are \$56.0 million higher than FY19. This is a result of increased basic education, special education, and vocational education revenues and increased reimbursement for increased retirement expenditures. These increases are slightly offset by a reduction in transportation and social security reimbursements. FY19 year-to-date State revenues compared to FY18 are relatively flat (an increase of \$2.4 million) as a result of greater basic education and special education subsidies, transportation, and vocational education revenues offset by a reduction in Act 89 funding for Non-Public School Programs. Revenues and expenses associated with Act 89 moved to the Categorical fund beginning in FY19.
- Federal revenues year-to-date are relatively flat in FY20 compared to FY19 and FY18.
- Other Financing Sources year-to-date vary each year due to the sale of property or debt financing. The District completed a refunding and a public placement temporary borrowing in FY20 resulting in 7.3 million of year-todate other financing sources in FY20. Other Financing Sources year-to-date totals in FY19 and FY18 totaled \$0.1 million each.

Expenditures – Year over Year

The following table shows a year over year comparison of year-to-date expenditures from FY18 to FY20.

Significant differences in year-to-date expenditures in FY20 compared with prior years include:

- A. Salaries FY20 year-to-date salaries as compared to FY19 are \$22.9 million higher due to the combined effect of an increase in total staffing complement and salary increases. Year-to-date salaries were similar in FY19 and FY18. FY18 one-time payments associated with new labor contracts were partially offset by FY19 salary increases associated with the new contracts.
- B. Benefits FY20 year-to-date benefits as compared to FY19 are \$12.1 million higher due to the increase in total staffing and salary increases noted above. Similar to salaries, year-to-date benefits in FY19 and FY18 were similar. This is due to one-time benefit payments related to the new labor contracts in FY18 offset by the benefits associated with the increased salaries in FY19.
- C. Non-Personnel Services (NPS) FY20 year-to-date non-personnel services as compared to FY19 are \$80.5 million higher primarily due to increased charter school tuition payments driven by increased charter enrollment and per pupil amount. In FY19, year-to-date NPS expenditures were higher compared to FY18 primarily due to increased charter school tuition payments, increased debt service expenditures, increased transportation payments, and early payment of temporary borrowing expenses.

Issues and Risks

The Quarter 3 report has been adjusted to reflect the three-quarter mark of the fiscal year and a better depiction of the District's spend. The Quarter 4 report will refine these projections as we begin to get a better picture of the end of the school year, the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, and begin the fiscal year closing process.

Current economic uncertainty resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic threatens District revenue as the District experiences reduced tax revenues and the District's largest funders, the City of Philadelphia and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, manage their budgets through the economic crisis. The Report includes real estate tax revenue projections based on the City's latest projections for FY20, and the District's best estimates for other Local Tax Revenues, which may be significantly impacted by the economic shifts related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In addition to the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, as part of the District's Environmental Safety Improvement Plan, there may be additional expenditures associated with continued work on environmental condition improvements.

The current Quarter 3 report also includes a (\$4.0) million decrease in charter expenditures; however any change in action on the part of the State Department of Education, changes to rates, and/or changes in special education identification rates, may lead to further 4th Quarter adjustments.

Finally, the District continues to face some uncertainty following a Court decision which could require the District to provide nearly \$35.0 million in tax credits, in relation to a lawsuit brought against the City related to its property assessment practices. Although many steps remain in this process, and the initial ruling could be overturned, this judgement would have an adverse effect on the District's finances representing a potential loss of approximately twenty-five percent of the District's projected FY20 ending Fund Balance.

Conclusion

The FY20 third quarter projection reflects the District's best estimate of the impacts of COVID-19 available to date. Though this projection reflects a growing operating deficit, it also currently projects FY20 as the District's sixth year with a positive ending fund balance. After many fiscal challenges resulting in reduced services to Philadelphia's schools and students, the District has been able to build on several years of investments and maintain a short-term positive fiscal outlook. However, the District is now facing a formidable fiscal challenge resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic and economic recession. The changing economic environment threatens District tax revenues, as well as the ability of the City and State to continue to provide current funding levels. In addition to the economic impacts of COVID-19, the District will continue to face projected increases in Special Education and Charter school costs, new labor contracts, and additional facilities needs.

FY20 Current Projection Operating Budget Summary

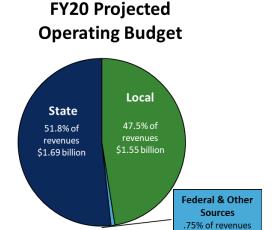

FY20 Current Projection

The District's budget consists of multiple funds: operating, categorical, capital, print, and food services. The current projections, excluding refunding, for the operating budget includes a \$3.27 billion revenue budget and a \$3.31 billion expenditure budget.

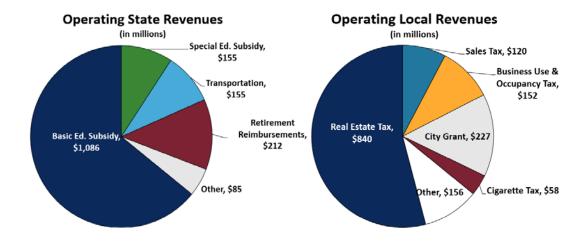
Operating Revenues

District revenues are provided by the state, city, federal governments, and other sources.

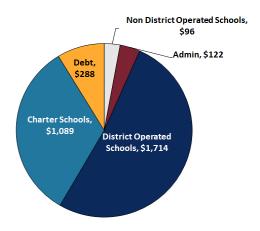
Approximately 54.1 percent of local revenues are generated from real estate tax. The remaining 45.9 percent of local revenues come from other taxes and fees and a City grant. Approximately 64.1 percent of state revenues are provided through the basic education subsidy. The remaining 35.9 percent of State revenues come from other subsidies and reimbursements.



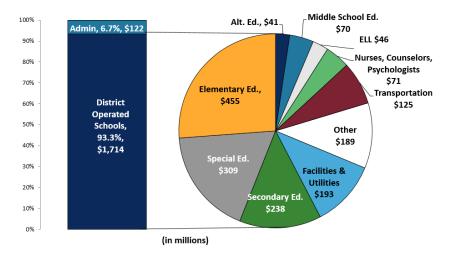

Operating Expenditures

The District's FY20 projected operating budget includes operating expenditures of \$3.31 billion. The District spends 87.6 percent of its operating budget directly on District, charter, and other non-District schools, with the remainder of the budget expended on debt service (8.7 percent) and District administration (3.7 percent).



Approximately 55.5 percent of the operating budget goes to District operated schools (including District administration). Of this amount, 51.8 percent goes to instruction, instructional support and other direct supports to schools. The remaining 3.7 percent is budgeted for District administration.



The remaining 44.5 percent is budgeted for charter schools (32.9 percent), other non-District operated schools (2.9 percent), and debt service (8.7 percent).

A school's budget consists of school-based allocations and centrally-allocated resources. The school-based allocations include both operating and grant resources. The operating resources are allocated for administration, teachers (enrollment driven + prep), school support positions, and discretionary funds. Grant resources are provided by Title I and Title II, SIG, and other grants. The centrally-allocated resources include positions such as special education, nurses, ESOL teachers, facilities, and security.

The following report details, for each District school in the current school year, a portion of the Title I budget and the amounts encumbered and expended through March 31, 2020. As of March 31, 2020, Title I full-time positions at schools were budgeted at \$83.1 million and year-to-date spend was \$54.2 million; Title I benefits for all school positions were budgeted at \$55.3 million and year-to-date spend was \$33.6 million. There is a proactive effort to assist schools in purchasing on an on-going basis. Further, as the year progresses, Finance staff identify those schools that are slow to spend their funds and contact them to identify roadblocks and assist in the spending process consistent with their Schoolwide Plan.
