## **Overview of the Quarterly School Manager Report**

The Quarterly School Manager Report is a summary report on the finances and management of the School District of Philadelphia. It is prepared by the Office of Finance.

The purpose of the Quarterly School Manager Report is to provide senior management of the School District of Philadelphia with a summary of the District's progress in implementing the financial and management goals of the current fiscal year on both a "Year-to-date Actual" basis and on a "Forecast for Full Year" basis.

While the Quarterly School Manager Report focuses narrowly on the financial management of the District, it is important to keep in mind the real educational impacts to children and families of the District's financial status. Many schools lack a full array of resources and educational opportunities. Our financial plans are only effective to the extent that they provide for an adequate education of all public school children in Philadelphia.

The Quarterly School Manager Report contains the following reports and schedules:

**Operating and Federal COVID-19 Relief Funds:** The Quarterly School Manager Report presents a combined presentation of revenues and expenses for the principal operating funds, in addition to detailed revenue categories in the general, intermediate unit, and debt service funds; and expenditure and current budget information divided according to the District's functional hierarchy. Additionally, this report includes revenue and expenditures for Federal COVID-19 relief funds.

The principal operating funds of the District consist of a General Fund, Intermediate Unit (IU) Fund, and a Debt Service Fund. The District is required, as a result of its covenants to holders of fixed rate bonds of the School District, to deposit funds into its sinking funds during the current fiscal year to pay some of the debt service due in the next fiscal year.

For all quarters except the fourth quarter, the operating reports present quarterly year-to-date actuals for the current fiscal year and prior two fiscal years; the current full year projection and full year actuals or latest projection for the prior two years; and the year-to-date actuals as a percentage of the total year. The fourth quarter report presents the current year amended budget, current full year projection, the current year projected budget variance, and full year obligations for the prior two years.

**Cash Flow:** The Cash Flow section includes year-to-date cash flow and vendor payment information. The School District's adopted cash flow is based on the current fiscal year's adopted budget. The cash flow projections are updated to reflect actual year-to-date results and changes to assumptions as to the timing of revenues and the payment of expense which are made as a result of actual

events. The vendor payments report includes the cash payments made to date in the fiscal year to the District's vendors. The list contains payments inclusive of operating and grants expenditures.

**Personnel Reports:** The Position Summary Report contains budgeted and projected Full Time Equivalent positions and current On-Board actual employees. Budgeted and projected positions are derived from the Office of Management and Budget personnel projection system reconciled to the Staffing Management System for school-based positions. Current On-Board employees are taken from the District's Advantage HR Staffing system and include On-Board employees at months-end with status codes 1 (Active), 2 (Acting), 3 (Long-Term Substitutes), and other codes for certain employee groups. There may be instances when the Count (Filled column) is fractional which represents an employee in a part-time position. The Quarterly School Manager Report also includes a Vacancy Report which is a listing of teacher vacancies by school for operating and grant funds.

The Position Report and Vacancy Report may vary due to timing differences, different definitions of what constitutes a vacancy, and different definitions of when a vacancy is considered filled.

**Supplementary Materials:** This section of the Quarterly School Manager Report contains additional materials related to the operations of the School District.

The Debt Service Schedule is the District's current fiscal year projected operating debt service budget (net of refunding), which depicts each bond series outstanding broken down by principal and interest due in the current fiscal year. "Trapped funds<sup>1</sup>" reserved or released in the current year are shown separately.

The Capital Projects reports include a listing of the District's activities related to capital projects, in addition to detailing the monthly year-to-date cash balances for all bond funds held to pay capital projects.

The documentation also includes information regarding the school allocation methodology, major grants funds and corresponding descriptions, school-by-school Title I budgets and spend, a summary of minority and women business enterprise participation, and a listing of the data posted on the District's website as part of the Open Data Initiative.

#### Introduction

#### Overview

The School District of Philadelphia's Quarterly School Manager Report for the period ended September 30, 2022 represents forward-looking statements and any such statements are subject to a variety of risks and uncertainties that could cause actual results to differ materially from those that have been projected. Please note that the FY22 projections contained in this report are preliminary and were completed before the District's FY22 closing process was complete and before audited financial statements were prepared.

As of the end of the first quarter of FY23, the District projects operating and Federal Relief Act revenues and sources of \$4.248 billion and operating and Federal Relief Act expenditures and uses of \$4.137 billion, resulting in a surplus of \$110.6 million excluding changes in reserves, and a surplus of \$138.9 million including changes in reserves<sup>2</sup>. The District is projected to end FY23 with a \$546.5 million positive ending fund balance.

The District's current projection reflects changes in revenue and expenditures relative to the May 26, 2022 Adopted Budget. The majority of these changes were highlighted in a presentation on July 14, 2022 after the 2022-2023 budgets for the City of Philadelphia and the State of Pennsylvania were finalized. Changes included: reductions in City real estate tax estimates, reductions in Basic Education, Level Up, and Special Education funding from the State relative to the Governor's original proposed budget, and a loss in savings associated with the Governor's proposed, but not approved changes to the cyber charter school tuition formula and changes to the charter school special education tuition formula. In addition, the District zeroed out the "TBD Expenditures" which were dependent on the full funding proposal being approved.

The District's projected FY23 fund balance of \$546.5 million represents a \$20.0 million decrease relative to the FY23 Adopted operating and Federal Relief Act ending fund balance of \$566.5 million.

#### **FY23 Projected Revenues and Sources**

- The FY23 projection estimates a (\$275.4) million decrease in operating and federal relief revenues compared to the Adopted Budget due to changes in local tax revenue estimates and State funding based on revised budgets and projections.
- The Local revenue decrease of (\$22.8) million is primarily made up of a (\$30.4) million reduction in estimated Real Estate Tax revenue, offset by a \$7.2 million

increase in Interest on Temporary Investments and Interest and Investment Earnings due to an increase in interest rates, as well as a \$0.4 million increase in all other Local revenue.

- The State revenue decrease of (\$252.6) million is primarily made up of a (\$204.0) million reduction in Basic Education funding and a (\$23.1) million reduction in Special Education funding that was included in the Governor's Proposed Budget but not in its final passing, as well as a (\$26.7) million reduction in Retirement and Social Security reimbursement associated with the estimated expense from the increased revenues that were not approved; and offset by a \$1.2 million increase in all other State Revenue.
- Federal Revenue and Federal COVID-19 Relief Revenue projections have not changed since the Adopted Budget.

## **FY22 Projected Expenditures and Uses**

- The current FY23 projection estimates a (\$266.8) million reduction in expenditures compared to the Adopted Budget due primarily to changes from the Governor's Proposed Budget compared to the final 2022-2023 State Budget.
- Expenditures associated with the Governor's Proposed Budget decreased by (\$412.1) million. The Adopted Budget assumed the addition of \$412.1 million in expense due to the proposed increase in State funding.
- Charter school expenditures increased by \$145.3 million because the changes proposed to the cyber charter formula and special education formula were not passed as part of the 2022-2023 State Budget. The Adopted Budget assumed \$145.3 million in expenditure savings associated with those proposals.

#### **Year Over Year Comparison**

Year-to-date revenue variances are primarily driven by the following:

- FY23 year-to-date Local Tax Revenue as compared to FY22 is lower by (\$3.1) million, primarily due to a (\$1.8) million reduction in the Cigarette Tax, a (\$1.4) million reduction in Sales Tax, and a net decrease of (\$1.1) million in all other Local Taxes due to timing differences in the receipt of payments, offset by a \$1.2 million increase in Public Utility Realty Tax. FY22 year-to-date Local Tax Revenue as compared to FY21 is higher by \$12.1 million, primarily due to a Liquor Sales Tax increase of \$7.5 million reflecting a return to pre-COVID levels, a \$3.9 million increase in Sales Tax, a \$3.4 million increase in Business Use and Occupancy Tax, and a \$1.2 million increase in Ridesharing Revenue, offset by a net (\$3.9) million reduction in Real Estate Tax and other Local Taxes.
- FY23 year-to-date Local Non-Tax Revenue as compared to FY22 is \$6.6 million higher due primarily to a \$3.5 million increase in the Grant from the City of Philadelphia and a combined \$3.1 million increase in Interest on Temporary Investments and Interest and Investment Earnings due to an increase in interest rates. FY22 year-to-date Local Non-Tax Revenue as compared to FY21 is \$63.3 million higher due primarily to the timing of the payment of the City grant.
- FY23 year-to-date State Revenue as compared to FY22 is \$22.3 million higher due to a \$28.5 million increase in Basic Education Funding and Special Education Funding, offset by a (\$4.9) million reduction in the Special Education Transportation subsidy and a (\$1.3) million net reduction in all other State revenue. FY22 year-to-date State Revenue as compared to FY21 is \$11.3 million higher due to a \$12.6 million increase in Basic Education and Special Education Funding offset by a net (\$1.3) million reduction in all other State revenues.
- There is no variance in year-to-date Federal Revenue between FY23 and FY22.
   The \$6.2 million difference in FY22 Federal Revenue compared to FY21 is primarily due to timing differences of when the Federal Debt Service Subsidy was received.
- FY23 year-to-date Federal Relief Revenue as compared to FY22 is \$73.6 million higher due to the timing of the receipt of Federal Relief Funds. No Federal Relief Revenue was received by the end of the first quarter in FY22 and FY21.
- Other Financing Sources year-to-date vary each year due to debt borrowing or the sale of property, and were \$0 in FY23, FY22, and FY21 at the end of the first quarter.

#### Expenditures – Year over Year

The following table shows a year over year comparison of first quarter year-to-date expenditures from FY21 to FY23.

Significant differences in year-to-date expenditures in FY23 compared with prior years include:

- A. Salaries Year-to-date salaries are \$65.5 million higher in FY23 compared to FY22, primarily due to a greater number of paid days in the quarter in addition to contractual increases as part of collective bargaining agreements settled in FY22 and the timing of bonus payments related to the agreements. Year-to-date salaries are \$9.3 million higher in FY22 compared to FY21 due primarily to an increase in salaries for additional summer programs to support learning recovery.
- B. Benefits Year-to-date benefits are (\$9.2) million lower in FY23 compared to FY22 and \$47.8 million higher in FY22 compared to FY21 primarily due to the timing of an accounting adjustment that was not completed by the end of the first quarter in FY22.
- C. Non-Personnel Services (NPS) FY23 year-to-date NPS expenditures are (\$39.2) million lower compared to FY22 primarily due to a (\$25.4) million net reduction in year-to-date charter expenditures due to the closure of three Renaissance charter schools as well as a reduction in charter school enrollment relative to Q1 of the prior year, and a (\$15.6) million reduction in Educational Technology due to the movement of a one-time expense from FY21 to FY22 noted below. FY22 year-to-date NPS expenditures are \$45.8 million higher compared to FY21 due primarily to a \$15.6 million one-time shift of Educational Technology expense from FY21 to FY22, a \$17.0 million increase in charter payments and charter transportation costs, a \$4.6 million increase in transportation expenditures due to a return to more normal in-person operations, and a \$2.5 million increase in facilities related expenditures.

#### **Prior Year Projection**

FY22 projected year-end operating and Federal Relief Act revenues are \$4.013 billion and FY22 projected year-end operating and Federal Relief Act expenditures are \$3.807 billion, resulting in an operating surplus of \$206.0 million excluding transfers from reserves and \$205.2 million including transfers from reserves<sup>3</sup>. With a FY22 beginning fund balance of \$202.5 million, the District is projected to end FY22 with a \$407.7

million positive ending fund balance. This represents a (\$11.4) million decrease relative to the FY22 Amended operating and Federal Relief Act ending fund balance of \$419.1 million. The projected year end fund balance represents 10.7 percent of expenditures and other uses or less than six weeks of expense.

#### Issues and Risks

The District is monitoring the impact of inflation, in particular in relation to increased costs for suppliers, food costs, and building related costs. Ongoing challenges and uncertainty in the labor market, both locally and nationally, also continue to impact the District's operations. The District is also waiting to see the full impact of the stock market losses on the State's pension fund and how that may impact PSERS retirement contribution rates.

In addition to the inflationary and staffing pressures noted above, the District is monitoring the potential impacts of political changes at both local and State levels which could have an impact on the District's primary funding sources in the coming years.

#### Conclusion

The current projections for FY23 reflect the District's best estimate of the impacts of COVID-19 and Federal Relief funding available to date. The District has improved the predictability for its largest expenditure - its workforce - for the next few years with the successful negotiation of several labor agreements in FY22 and FY23. At the same time, the challenges caused by the pandemic and inflationary pressures continue to create uncertainty as the District navigates staffing challenges, evolving protocols, and supports for students and staff. While this creates a dynamic fiscal challenge for the School District, the significant additional Federal Relief funds allow the District to both navigate the impacts of the pandemic and manage a short-term period of investment. The District has created a framework for how it will approach spending these one-time funds to achieve both learning recovery and identify fiscally sustainable supports for the long-term. ## FY23 Adopted Operating and Federal Relief Fund Budget Summary

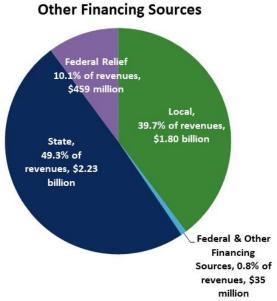
#### **FY23 Adopted Budget**

The FY23 Adopted Budget reflects the District's May 26, 2022 Adopted Budget and was passed prior to the completion of the City of Philadelphia's and State of Pennsylvania's final 2022-2023 budgets. The current projection included in this report reflects the final City and State budget numbers.

The District's budget consists of multiple funds: operating, categorical, capital, print, and food services. The Adopted Operating and Federal Relief Act budget includes a \$4.523 billion revenue budget and a \$4.404 billion expenditure budget.

#### Operating and Federal Relief Fund Revenues

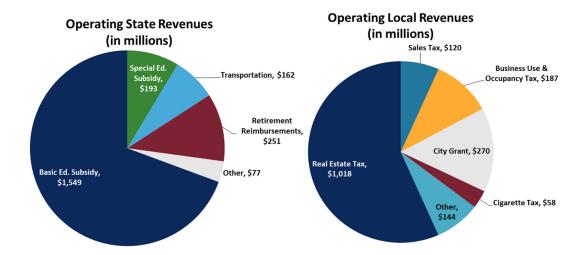
District revenues are provided by the state, city, federal governments, and other sources.



FY23 Adopted Budget Revenue & Other Financing Sources

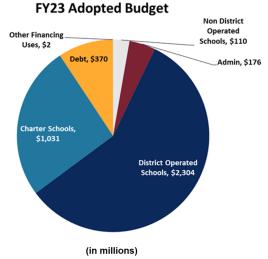
Approximately 56.6 percent of local revenues are generated from real estate tax. The remaining 43.4 percent of local revenues come from other taxes and fees and a City grant. Approximately 69.4 percent of state revenues are provided through the basic education subsidy. The remaining 30.6 percent of State revenues come from other subsidies and reimbursements.

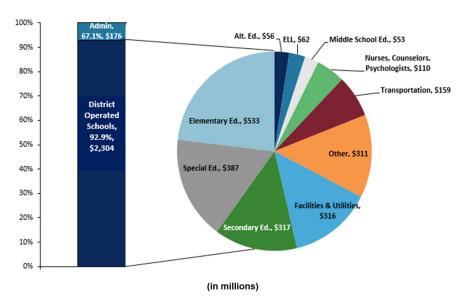
### Operating and Federal Relief Fund Expenditures

The District's FY23 projected operating and Federal Relief Act budget includes operating and Federal Relief Act expenditures of \$4.404 billion and \$3.999 billion excluding the \$412.1 million in to be determined expenditures associated with the Governor's Budget Proposal and Local Tax Revenues. Of the \$3.999 billion, the District spends 86.3 percent of its budget directly on District, charter, and other non-District schools, with the remainder of the budget expended on debt service (9.3 percent) and District administration (4.4 percent).



Approximately 62.1 percent of the operating budget goes to District operated schools (including District administration). Of this amount, 57.7 percent goes to instruction, instructional support and other direct supports to schools. The remaining 4.4 percent is budgeted for District administration.

The remaining 37.9 percent is budgeted for charter schools (25.9 percent), debt service (9.3 percent), and debt service (9.3 percent).

A school's budget consists of school-based allocations and centrally-allocated resources. The school-based allocations include both operating and grant resources. The operating resources are allocated for administration, teachers (enrollment driven + prep), school support positions, and discretionary funds. Grant resources are provided by Title I and Title II, SIG, and other grants. The centrally-allocated resources include positions such as special education, nurses, ESOL teachers, facilities, and security.
