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Overview of the Quarterly School Manager Report

The Quarterly School Manager Report is a summary report on the finances and management of the School District of Philadelphia. It is prepared by the Office of Finance.

The purpose of the Quarterly School Manager Report is to provide senior management of the School District of Philadelphia with a summary of the District's progress in implementing the financial and management goals of the current fiscal year on both a "Year-to-Date Actual" basis and on a "Forecast for Full Year" basis.

While the Quarterly School Manager Report focuses narrowly on the financial management of the District, it is important to keep in mind the real educational impacts to children and families of the District's financial status. Many schools lack a full array of resources and educational opportunities. Our financial plans are only effective to the extent that they provide for an adequate education of all public school children in Philadelphia.

The Quarterly School Manager Report contains the following reports and schedules:

Operating and Federal COVID-19 Relief Funds: The Quarterly School Manager Report presents a combined presentation of revenues and expenses for the principal operating funds, in addition to detailed revenue categories in the general, intermediate unit, and debt service funds; and expenditure and current budget information divided according to the District's functional hierarchy. Additionally, this report includes revenue and expenditures for Federal COVID-19 Relief Funds.

The principal operating funds of the District consist of a General Fund, Intermediate Unit (IU) Fund, and a Debt Service Fund. The District is required, as a result of its covenants to holders of fixed rate bonds of the School District, to deposit funds into its sinking funds during the current fiscal year to pay some of the debt service due in the next fiscal year.

For all quarters except the fourth quarter, the operating reports present quarterly year-to-date actuals for the current fiscal year and prior two fiscal years; the current full year projection and full year actuals or latest projection for the prior two years; and the year-to-date actuals as a percentage of the total year. The fourth quarter report presents the current year amended budget, current full year projection, the current year projected budget variance, and full year obligations for the prior two years.

Cash Flow: The Cash Flow section includes year-to-date cash flow and vendor payment information. The School District's adopted cash flow is based on the current fiscal year's adopted budget. The cash flow projections are updated to reflect actual year-to-date results and changes to assumptions as to the timing of revenues and the payment of expense which are made as a result of actual

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events. The vendor payments report includes the cash payments made to date in the fiscal year to the District's vendors. The list contains payments inclusive of operating and grants expenditures.

Personnel Reports: The Position Summary Report contains budgeted and projected Full Time Equivalent positions and current On-Board actual employees. Budgeted and projected positions are derived from the Office of Management and Budget personnel projection system reconciled to the Staffing Management System for school-based positions. Current On-Board employees are taken from the District's Advantage HR Staffing system and include On-Board employees at months-end with status codes 1 (Active), 2 (Acting), 3 (Long-Term Substitutes), and other codes for certain employee groups. There may be instances when the Count (Filled column) is fractional which represents an employee in a part-time position. The Quarterly School Manager Report also includes a Vacancy Report which is a listing of teacher vacancies by school for operating and grant funds.

The Position Report and Vacancy Report may vary due to timing differences, different definitions of what constitutes a vacancy, and different definitions of when a vacancy is considered filled.

Supplementary Materials: This section of the Quarterly School Manager Report contains additional materials related to the operations of the School District.

The Debt Service Schedule is the District's current fiscal year projected operating debt service budget (net of refunding), which depicts each bond series outstanding broken down by principal and interest due in the current fiscal year. "Trapped funds¹" reserved or released in the current year are shown separately.

The Capital Projects reports include a listing of the District's activities related to capital projects, in addition to detailing the monthly year-to-date cash balances for all bond funds held to pay capital projects.

The documentation also includes information regarding the school allocation methodology, major grants funds and corresponding descriptions, school-by-school Title I budgets and spend, a summary of minority and women business enterprise participation, and a listing of the data posted on the District's website as part of the Open Data Initiative.

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¹ In order to be compliant with Local Government Unit Debt Act (LGUDA) guidelines that all debt be amortized, bonds with a bullet maturity must have debt service payments set aside to pay the future principal and interest when it comes due as if there were an amortization schedule. Those funds that are set aside are considered trapped and are released when the payment is due.

Introduction

Overview

The School District of Philadelphia's Quarterly School Manager Report for the period ended December 31, 2023 represents forward-looking statements and any such statements are subject to a variety of risks and uncertainties that could cause actual results to differ materially from those that have been projected. Please note that the FY23 actuals contained in this report are based on the District's unaudited financial statements.

As of the end of the second quarter of FY24, the District projects operating and Federal Relief Act revenues and sources of \$4.551 billion and operating and Federal Relief Act expenditures and uses of \$4.476 billion, resulting in a surplus of \$74.4 million excluding changes in reserves, and a surplus of \$65.0 million including changes in reserves². The District is projected to end FY24 with a \$747.9 million positive ending fund balance.

The District's projected FY24 fund balance of \$747.9 million represents a \$57.3 million increase, or less than a week of District expenses, relative to the FY24 Adopted Operating and Federal Relief Act ending fund balance of \$690.6 million.

Second Quarter Report Revised Projections

The District's currently projected year-end fund balance of \$747.9 million, as of December 31, 2023, represents a \$58.7 million increase from September 30, 2023, primarily due to an increase in prior year fund balance, an increase in projected revenue from the City of Philadelphia, and a reduction in projected expense. FY24 adjustments since the September projection include:

• Revised FY24 projected revenues

- \$13.2 million increase in Local Tax Revenue due to a \$7.4 million increase in Business Use and Occupancy Tax, a net \$3.9 million increase in Real Estate Tax, and a \$2.2 million increase in School Income Tax, offset by a (\$1.1) million reduction in Liquor Sales Tax, and a net \$0.8 million increase in all other Local Taxes;
- \$10.3 million increase in Local Non Tax Revenue due to a \$7.0 million net increase in Interest, a \$2.6 million increase in Miscellaneous Non Tax, and a net increase of \$0.7 million in all other Local Non Tax Revenue;
- (\$5.9) million reduction in State Revenue due to a (\$3.1) million reduction in projected retirement and social security reimbursements, a (\$1.2) million reduction in Transportation reimbursement, and a net (\$1.6) million reduction in all other State Revenue;

² Transfers from Reserves are not included in the total expenditures. FY24 transfers from reserves are an unfavorable net (\$9.4) million for trapped funds related to debt service.

- \$0.3 million increase in Federal Revenue due to the receipt of additional Impacted Area Aid from a prior year period;
- (\$19.6) million decrease in Federal Covid-19 Relief Revenue due to the timing of when Federal Relief Funds will be spent, which impacts the timing of Federal Relief Reimbursement; and
- \$7.7 million increase in Other Financing Sources due to a projected increase in the administrative costs received from categorical funds, in addition to a premium received as part of the District's annual temporary borrowing.

Revised FY24 projected expenditures

- (\$48.0) million reduction in District Operated Schools expense primarily due to a correction of a (\$21.1) million shift in Transportation Service expenses to the Services to Non Public Schools Transportation budget line, a (\$20.2) million reduction in the Additional Support reserve lines which are now reflected in the appropriate budget lines, and a net (\$6.7) million reduction in all other District Operated Schools expenditures;
- (\$2.5) million reduction in Debt Service expense due to a (\$2.2) million reduction in Short Term Debt Service, and a (\$0.3) million reduction in Long Term Debt Service;
- (\$8.2) million reduction in Charter School expenses, comprised of a reduction of (\$4.4) million in charter tuition and (\$3.8) million of charter transportation expense, due to lower enrollment than anticipated in Renaissance, Cyber, and Non Philadelphia Charter Schools;
- \$22.5 million increase in Other Non District Operated Schools expense primarily due to the above mentioned correction to shift Transportation expense from District Operated Schools to Other Non District Operated Schools:
- (\$1.2) million reduction in Administration expense, primarily driven by the reduction of the Additional Support reserve line which is mostly offset by its allocation to the appropriate budget lines;
- \$3.5 million increase in Undistributed Budgetary Adjustments primarily due to a reporting shift of the remaining Additional Support reserve funds budgeted at Adoption in the District Operating Schools and Administration; and
- \$1.2 million increase in Other Financing Uses primarily due to an increase in the projected transfer to the Food Services Fund, accounting for the increased personnel costs associated with the recently ratified Unite Here! Local 634 contract.

Year-to-date revenue variances are primarily driven by the following:

- FY24 year-to-date Local Tax Revenue as compared to FY23 is higher by \$29.8 million, primarily due to a \$14.5 million net increase in Real Estate Tax, a \$12.6 million increase in Business Use and Occupancy Tax, a \$2.9 million increase in Sales Tax, and a \$2.0 million increase in Liquor Tax, offset by a net decrease in all other Local Tax Revenue of (\$2.2) million. FY23 year-to-date Local Tax Revenue as compared to FY22 is higher by \$1.2 million, primarily due to a combined \$7.0 million increase in Liquor Sales Tax, School Income Tax, Business Use and Occupancy Tax, Sales Tax, and Ridesharing revenue, offset by a (\$5.8) million net reduction in Real Estate Tax, Cigarette Tax revenue, and Public Utility Tax;
- FY24 year-to-date Local Non-Tax Revenue as compared to FY23 is (\$55.8) million lower due to a (\$64.5) million decrease in the Grant from the City of Philadelphia. This is due to the timing of when the funding was received in comparison to the prior year. This reduction is offset by a \$6.3 million increase in Interest and a net increase of \$2.4 million in all other Local Non-Tax Revenue. FY23 year-to-date Local Non-Tax Revenue as compared to FY22 is \$20.5 million higher due to \$12.3 million increase in Interest, a \$7.0 million increase in the City Grant, and a \$1.2 million increase in all other Local Non Tax Revenue;
- FY24 year-to-date State Revenue as compared to FY23 is \$25.3 million higher due to a \$51.1 million increase in State subsidies for Basic Education, and a \$7.2 million net increase in State reimbursement for Transportation, offset by a (\$25.4) million reduction in retirement reimbursement, a combined (\$7.4) million reduction in the Special Education Subsidy and Vocational Education Subsidy

due to the timing of the receipt of the subsidies, and a (\$0.2) million reduction in all other State Revenue. FY23 year-to-date State Revenue as compared to FY22 is \$82.6 million higher due to a combined \$83.8 million increase in State subsidies for Basic Education, Special Education, Vocational Education, and Special Education Program, and a \$2.2 million increase in retirement reimbursement, offset by a (\$1.2) million reduction in social security reimbursement, and a (\$2.2) million net reduction in Transportation subsidies;

- FY24 year-to-date Federal Revenue as compared to FY23 is \$2.2 million higher due to a \$1.9 million increase in the Federal Debt Service Subsidy and a \$0.3 million increase in Impacted Area Aid due to the timing of the receipt of a prior year payment. FY23 year-to-date Federal Revenue as compared to FY22 is (\$2.1) million lower, due to a reduction in the Federal Debt Service Subsidy;
- Federal Relief Revenue year-to-date varies each year due to the timing of reimbursement and the distribution of funds across fiscal years. FY24 year-to-date Federal Relief Revenue is \$4.3 million higher than FY23. FY23 year-to-date Federal Relief Revenue is \$60.4 million higher than FY22; and
- Other Financing Sources year-to-date vary each year due to debt borrowing or the sale of property, and were \$2.2 million year-to-date in FY24, and \$0 year-to-date in FY23 and FY22.

Expenditures – Year over Year

The following table shows a year over year comparison of second quarter year-to-date expenditures from FY22 to FY24.

Significant differences in year-to-date expenditures in FY24 compared with prior years include:

A. Salaries – Year-to-date salaries are \$5.1 million higher in FY24 compared to FY23 and \$19.2 million higher in FY23 compared to FY22. FY24 and FY23 include contractual increases as part of collective bargaining agreements settled in FY22; in addition, FY23 includes bonus payments related to the agreements for the District's various unions.

- B. Benefits Year-to-date benefits are \$2.0 million higher in FY24 compared to FY23, primarily due to increases associated with the above-mentioned salary increases partially offset by a reduction in the State's retirement employer contribution rate. Year-to-date benefits are (\$34.2) million lower in FY23 compared to FY22 primarily due to the timing of an accounting adjustment that was not completed by the end of the second quarter in FY22.
- C. Non-Personnel Services (NPS) Year-to-date NPS expenditures are \$132.4 million higher compared to FY23, primarily due to a \$123.4 million increase in year-to-date charter school expenses due to higher tuition rates, and a \$21.3 million increase related to the central curriculum purchase on the Federal Relief funds. FY23 year-to-date NPS expenditures are (\$117.9) million lower compared to FY22 primarily due to a (\$132.5) million reduction in year-to-date charter school expense and a (\$21.4) million reduction in year-to-date Educational Technology expense. Charter payments for the month of December 2021 and January 2022 were both reflected in December of 2021. The Educational Technology expense reflects a one time expense that took place in FY22. The above reduction is offset by net increases in all other NPS expenditures, primarily driven by a \$12.1 million increase in District utility costs, and a \$10.3 million increase in secondary education expenses.

Prior Year Actuals

The District's FY23 unaudited actuals include operating revenues of \$4.108 billion and operating expenditures of \$3.858 billion, resulting in an operating surplus of \$250.4 million excluding transfers from reserves and \$278.7 million including transfers from reserves³. The District will end FY23 with a \$682.9 million positive ending fund balance. This represents a \$26.9 million increase compared to the FY23 Amended operating and Federal Relief Act ending fund balance of \$656.0 million. The year end fund balance represents 17.7 percent of expenditures and other uses or less than three months of expenses.

Issues and Risks

As noted in prior quarterly reports, the issues below continue to be key drivers that will impact the finances and operations of the District.

Strategic Plan Implementation

On June 1, 2023, the Board of Education adopted the *Accelerate Philly Strategic Plan*. The plan outlines 62 Strategic Actions that will guide the District over the next five years towards achieving the Board of Education's Goals and Guardrails as well as the

³ Transfers from Reserves are not included in the total expenditures. FY23 transfers from reserves were a favorable net \$28.3 million related to debt service which includes (\$13.4) million of newly trapped funds offset by a release of \$41.7 million of previously trapped funds which were treated as an expense in FY23.

District's ultimate vision, "[t]o prepare students to imagine and realize any future they desire." *Accelerate Philly* delineates five critical Priority Areas:

- 1. Priority Area 1: Improve safety and well-being (physical, social-emotional, and environmental):
- 2. Priority Area 2: Partner with families and community;
- 3. Priority Area 3: Accelerate academic achievement;
- 4. Priority Area 4: Recruit and retain diverse and highly effective educators; and
- 5. Priority Area 5: Deliver efficient, high-quality, cost-effective operations.

Collective Bargaining Agreements

The District completed longer-term agreements with all of its collective bargaining units in FY22 and FY23, providing greater predictability for its largest expenditure - its workforce. As the current agreements expire, new long-term contracts will be collectively bargained. Below are the current end dates of all labor contracts:

- Philadelphia Federation of Teachers: August 31, 2024;
- Commonwealth Association of School Administrators: August 31, 2025;
- School Police Association of Philadelphia: August 31, 2026;
- Service Employees International Union Local 32BJ: August 31, 2026; and
- Unite Here! Local 634: September 30, 2027.

Fair Funding Case

In a February 2023 ruling, the Commonwealth Court President declared that the current statewide system for allocating funding to schools is inadequate and inequitable. The Court tasked the General Assembly and the Executive Branch with both increasing funding statewide and providing a fairer share to districts with greater needs, like Philadelphia.

Per Section 123(k) of the Public School Code, the 2023 Basic Education Funding Commission (BEFC) was charged with reviewing the distribution of state funding for basic education to Pennsylvania's 500 school districts and providing a report of its findings to the General Assembly. On January 11, 2024, the BEFC adopted a report stating that the School District of Philadelphia's adequacy gap is \$1.419 billion and recommended a five-year plan to reach statewide adequacy targets that would increase year-over-year funding by \$242.7 million for FY25.

On February 6, 2024, the Governor proposed a budget that was largely in line with year 1 of the BEFC report and called for an additional \$242 million in Basic Education Funding for the School District of Philadelphia.

The District will continue to monitor in the coming months as the Executive and Legislature works towards meeting its Constitutional promise to adequately and equitably fund K-12 education. With fair funding in place, the District could execute the

Accelerate Philly Strategic Plan with fidelity and purpose, thus enacting the kind of transformation that could counteract more than a century of school underfunding, and finally give students the education that they deserve.

Phase Out of Covid-19 Federal Relief Funding

Although the District is projected to end FY24 with a significant fund balance, the majority of the revenue associated with COVID-19 Federal Relief Funding will expire September 30, 2024, leading to an unprecedented fiscal cliff. The projected fund balance covers less than three months worth of District expenses and is needed to help the District bridge any gaps that will result from the fiscal cliff. As part of the current FY25 budget development process, the District is proactively implementing strategies to reduce the District's projected structural deficits in the coming years, and retain some level of fund balance revenue to cover that transition and any future gaps in funding that may exist if increased funding is not available.

Conclusion

The Quarter 2 report reflects the half-way mark of the fiscal year and is a better depiction of the District's spend than the Quarter 1 report. The Quarter 3 report will refine these projections as the school year progresses.

The challenges caused by the pandemic and inflationary pressures, the age of District buildings, and climate and safety, continue to create a dynamic fiscal challenge for the School District. Federal Relief funds have allowed the District to both navigate the impacts of the pandemic and effectively manage a short-term period of budgetary surplus. As Federal Relief funds and current labor agreements expire in the near future, the District must prudently manage its finances in order to meet the Board of Education's Goals and Guardrails, appropriately endow the *Accelerate Philly Strategic Plan* and circumvent the impending structural deficit.

FY24 Adopted Operating and Federal Relief Fund Budget Summary

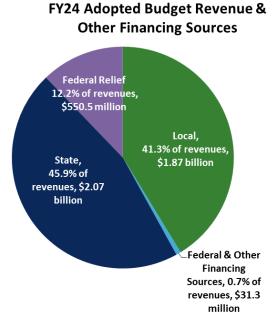
FY24 Adopted Budget

The FY24 Adopted Budget reflects the District's May 25, 2023 Adopted Budget and was passed prior to the completion of the City of Philadelphia's and State of Pennsylvania's final 2023-2024 budgets. The current projection included in this report reflects the final City and State budget numbers.

The District's budget consists of multiple funds: operating, categorical, capital, print, and food services. The Adopted Operating and Federal Relief Act budget includes a \$4.523 billion revenue budget and a \$4.479 billion expenditure budget.

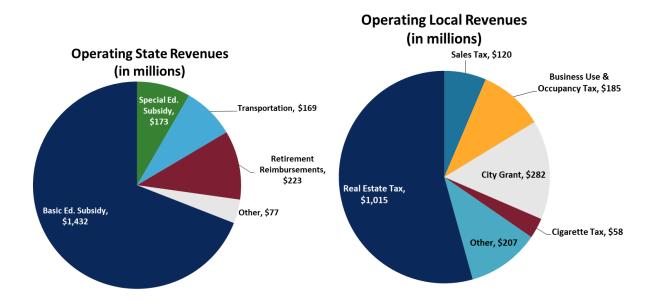
Operating and Federal Relief Fund Revenues

District revenues are provided by the state, city, federal governments, and other sources.



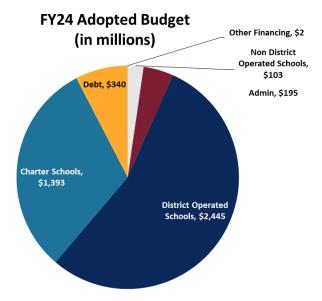
Approximately 54.3 percent of local revenues are generated from real estate tax. The remaining 45.7 percent of local revenues come from other taxes and fees and a City grant. Approximately 69.0 percent of state revenues are provided through the basic education subsidy. The remaining 31.0 percent of State revenues come from other subsidies and reimbursements.

Source: FY23-24 Adopted Budget



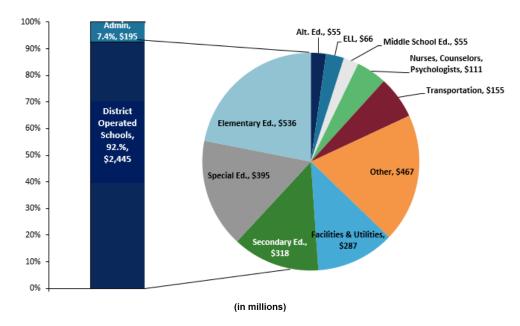
Operating and Federal Relief Fund Expenditures

The District's FY24 projected operating and Federal Relief Act budget includes operating and Federal Relief Act expenditures of \$4.479 billion. Of the \$4.479 billion, the District spends 88.0 percent of its budget directly on District, charter, and other non-District schools, with the remainder of the budget expended on debt service (7.6 percent) and District administration (4.4 percent).



Approximately 59.0 percent of the operating budget goes to District operated schools (including District administration). Of this amount, 92.6 percent goes to instruction, instructional support and other direct supports to schools. The remaining 7.4 percent is budgeted for District administration.

The remaining 41.0 percent is budgeted for charter schools (31.1 percent), debt service (7.6 percent), and other financing (.05 percent).
