At that time parents will be given an opportunity to review the plan and the budget and ask questions and make suggestions regarding what they would like included in the plan.

3. The <u>School District of Philadelphia</u> will provide the following necessary coordination, technical assistance, and other support to assist Title I, Part A schools in planning and implementing effective parental involvement activities to improve student academic achievement and school performance:

- In collaboration with the Grants Compliance Monitor, School-Community Liaisons, Philadelphia Home and School Council (PHSC), Title I Parent Advisory Committee, The Philadelphia Right to Know Educational Task Force, PARENT POWER, and other parent groups, provide workshops to schools on parent engagement.

4. Evaluations are made throughout the year during monthly Home and School meetings, IB and AP information sessions conducted by the President. We will provide a survey to parents during the November Parent-Teachers conferences to obtain information regarding the Parent Involvement Policy. Ms. Scott will tally the response from the survey and make the results available to administration, teachers and parents in order to address the areas of concerns that develop from the results. Also, in the spring of 2017, the School District parent survey will be distributed to gather information to address any concerns of parents. The school will collect and use the data to evaluate its

During Back-to-School night on September 22, 2016, the President provided the State's academic and achievement standards as well as the State's local assessments. The president also, discussed the Title I funding, parent involvement and Right To Know requirements. Parents can monitor their child's progress through FamilyNet, EdLine, and Gradebook. Parents can also monitor their child's progress during Report Card Conferences. Parents are also encouraged to work with their child's teachers and counselors to ensure academic success.

B. The <u>Central High School</u> will, with the assistance of the School District, provide materials and training to help parents work with their children to improve their children's academic achievement, such as literacy training, and using technology, as appropriate, to foster parental involvement, by:

Sharing skill development in Academic support, mentoring parents on how to support their child's rigorous academic program at Central. Workshops will be available for parents to provide technology training on FamilyNet and EdLine. During Freshman Orientation and the November Report Card Conferences, parents will be given the opportunity to be trained on EdLine and FamilyNet. Parents will also be invited to attend any workshops or information sessions regarding the College and Financial Aid application process.

C. The <u>Central High School</u> will, with the assistance of the School District, educate its teachers, pupil services personnel, principals and other staff, in how to reach out to, communicate with, and work with parents as equal partners, in the value and utility of contributions of parents, and in how to implement and coordinate parent programs and build ties between parents and schools, by:

In addition to the existing protocols, information will be provided to all staff, including non-instructional staff, on how to improve communication and better support parents. Educators will have the opportunity to receive additional training provided during one or more of the following District professional development days, September 30, 2016, November 8, 2016, January 3, 2017, March 6, 2017 (half) and/or March 31, 2017 (half). Survey data collected will also be used to inform staff about the concerns of parents.

D. The <u>Central High School</u> will, to the extent feasible and appropriate, coordinate and integrate parental involvement programs and activities with Head Start, Reading First, Early Reading First, Even Start, Home Instruction Programs for Preschool Youngsters, the Parents as Teachers Program, and public preschool and other programs, and conduct other activities, such as parent resource centers, that encourage and support parents in more fully participating in the education of their children, by:

In the main office, parents have access to a designated computer and work station. There is also an abundance of resource material for parents. The counselors are available upon request and The Home and School has a designated area where parents are welcomed. The parent and Family Resource Centers (several locations throughout the district) serves as a catalyst for creating a culture of accountability and gives all stakeholders ownership that meet the diverse needs of all families, as stated on the SDP website.

The <u>Central High School</u> will take the following actions to ensure that information related to the school and parent- programs, meetings, and other activities, is sent to the parents of participating children in an understandable and uniform format, including alternative formats upon request, and, to the extent practicable, in a language the parents can understand:

School Communication will occur through written form, Parent Link Phone System, posted on the Central.net website and hard copies when necessary will be distributed to students. Bilingual counseling assistants will translate school communication in the target language (s) for parents. The School District's Office of Translation is utilized when needed.
