Dear Parents, Guardians and Students,

After meeting with the CHS Administrative Team, teacher leaders and our lead counselor on Friday, June 5, 2020, I have made the decision to make all traditional summer assignments optional for the 2020 summer break. In past years, teachers would assign mandatory assignments as prerequisite work for their courses, and novels would be assigned for summer reading. The work would be assessed and graded. This will not occur during this year's summer break. Our students have dealt with historic levels of stress during the Covid-19 pandemic closure, the senseless killing of George Floyd and the societal unrest related to institutional racism in our nation. Our students need to relax, spend time with friends and family, and recharge for the fall.

I am allowing teachers to post optional assignments for students. These assignments will not be assessed for grades and/or extra credit. Teachers who are posting assignments will contact students via email and their Google classroom pages, or list assignments on departmental pages. These assignments are not mandatory.
