Welcome to Kindergarten!

Let's get to know each other.

Your child will grow and learn so much in the kindergarten year. You want your child's teacher to understand your child's unique talents, interests, and needs.

Pennsylvania's Kindergarten Entry Inventory can help. This tool will give you and your child's teacher a snapshot of your child's strengths and areas that may need support. With this information, together you and your child's teacher can give your child the best possible learning experience in the classroom and at home.



What is the Kindergarten Entry Inventory?

The Kindergarten Entry Inventory is a tool your child's teacher can use to understand where your child is with his/her physical development and social and academic skills.

How does it work?

In the first month and a half of school, the teacher will observe your child during regular classroom activities and jot down his/her skill levels based on Pennsylvania's Early Learning Standards. **The Kindergarten Entry Inventory is NOT a test!** It is a reliable way for you and your child's teacher to understand your child's skill levels and what your child needs for a successful kindergarten year.

What happens next?

Your child's teacher will share the results with you and discuss ways to support your child. She may offer new activities, books, or games for home or school with your child in mind.

With the Kindergarten Entry Inventory, your child's teacher will get a snapshot of your child's skills. Here are a few examples:

Social and Emotional Development such as:

English Language Arts such as:

Mathematics such as:

Approaches to Learning such as:
