Introduction to Finding Grants

- Where: Regional Foundation Center @ Parkway Central Free Library
- When: May 7, 2019
- Description: Discover what funders are looking for in nonprofits seeking grants. During this interactive workshop you will learn: who funds nonprofits, what funders want to know about organizations they are interested in funding, how to identify potential funders and make the first approach.

Intermediate Grant Writing

- When: May 21, 2019
- Description: Intermediate Grant Writing is an interactive workshop where participants review aspects of a strong grant proposal, practice reading and critiquing actual grant applications, and have the opportunity to receive constructive feedback on their own proposal. Participants are encouraged and welcomed, but not required to bring a copy of their own grant proposal or draft (1-2 pages) to receive individualized feedback from peers and a professional from the nonprofit grants world. OPPORTUNITIES FOR CLASSROOMS AND SCHOOLS (in order of deadline)

USC Shoah Foundation

- Scope: The USC Shoah Foundation and Discovery Education seek entrants for the Teaching with Testimony Stronger Than Hate Challenge.
- Description: To enter the challenge, students will listen to eyewitness testimonies that explore historical and modern-day stories of hate, investigate whether these are occurring in their school or community, develop insight into the opportunities for change, and build a video essay telling the story of how they made their community and the world a better place.
- Deadline: May 6.
- Funds: Student scholarships range from \$500-\$5,000. First-place winner's teacher receives \$1,000 and first-place winner's school receives \$2,500.

Youth Literacy Grant, Dollar General

Technology Teacher Grant

- Scope: Verizon Invites K-12 Teachers in the U.S. to apply for a grant to use for the purchase of virtual reality (VR) equipment for their classroom.
- Description: Studies suggest that VR-enhanced instruction can improve knowledge retention, concentration, and subject comprehension. With VR equipment, teachers can take students on virtual field trips, build a new skill in a safe environment, or travel back in time — the options are limitless. Criteria for applications:
 - Creativity — Is the educational plan original, creative and fun for students? Does it combine VR technology with carefully designed lessons to engage students and promote learning.
 - Feasibility — Can the plan be reasonably carried out in the classroom? Will the lesson plan and VR experiences be implemented within the current or upcoming school year.

- Age appropriateness — Will the VR technology be used for age-appropriate activities? Is the plan to use VR in the classroom tailored to fit the needs of K-12 students?
- Measurability — Can the applicant measure the success of VR learning in his/her classroom? Will there be corresponding tests, assignments, or other measures of student knowledge and participation?
- Deadline: May 21
- Funds: Two awards of \$1,000
- Eligibility: Applicants must be employed full-time as a K-12 teacher at an elementary, middle, or high school in the United States and must intend to continue teaching full-time through the 2020-2021 school year. All applicants must be a U.S. citizen or permanent legal resident of the United States.

National Weather Association Foundation

Educator for Equity Grants

- Scope: Educators for Equity Grant Program, a new initiative for helping teachers foster student growth for students who face systemic barriers to academic opportunities.
- Description: When evaluating applications, the selection committee will consider the following:
 - Populations served: Extent to which the program supports students who face systemic barriers to academic opportunities, including students who

identify as Black or African American, Hispanic/Latino, Native American, or Asian/Pacific Islander; students learning English and speaking a language other than English fluently; and students experiencing economic disadvantage.

- Evidence base: Justification of an evidence-based, high quality program focused on facilitating the academic development of students
- Equity mission: Alignment with the priority to remove systemic barriers to academic success for economically disadvantaged students and/or students of color
- Cultural relevance: Evidence of culturally-relevant fit of the program based on the community/populations served
- Academic focus: Explicitly focused on improving academic opportunities and outcomes for students served
- Budget: The extent to which grant awards will go to program operations, versus supplies and materials. (Funding is not intended for the primary purpose of purchasing supplies and materials.)
 - Whether an applicant uses NWEA products and services will **not** be taken into account
- Deadline: June 30th
- Funds: Up to \$10,000
- Eligibility: U.S. school serving students from pre-K through 12th grade and either: (i) be a public school; or (ii) have an IRS determination letter of 501(c)(3) status.
