Upcoming Deadlines

Opportunity: McCarthy Dressman Education Foundation

Due Date: Application closes April 15 *OR before they reach 200 application submissions.*

Eligible Applicants: K-12 teachers

Purpose: The Foundation provides both academic enrichment grants and teacher development grants. The Foundation sponsors proposals that enhance student learning and educational quality, paying particular attention to those that best serve the at-risk and under-funded, including: curriculum that excites and challenges; inquiry projects that promote reflection and growth; and afterschool programs that enrich and inspire. The Foundation partners with individuals to expand educational opportunities for America's youth that inspire students by nurturing their curiosity about the world and their place in it.

Estimated Range of Awards: Up to \$10,000 for a maximum budget of \$20,000 over 2 years

Opportunity: Justin J. Watts Foundation Equipment Grants

Due Date: April 15, 2024 by 6PM for fall sports starting in August, September, or October 2024

Eligible Applicants: Schools serving grades 6-8 *that have not previously received funding.*

Purpose: The Justin J. Watt Foundation offers support to middle schools that do not have sufficient funding for after-school and athletic programs. The foundation offers Equipment Grants for after-school programs, such as athletic teams for grade 6 through 8. Examples of eligible items include uniforms with school name or numbers; safety equipment, such as helmets, pads, or mats; balls, bats, or nets; and reasonable storage equipment.

Opportunity: Dollar General Youth Literacy Grants

Due Date: April 25, 2024

Eligible Applicants: Schools and nonprofit organizations who help students who are below grade level, have learning disabilities, are English Language Learners, or have Individualized Education Plans (IEP) are eligible to apply.

Purpose: Grant funding is provided to assist in the following areas: implementing new or expanding existing literacy programs; purchasing new technology or equipment to support literacy initiatives; and purchasing books, materials or software for literacy programs.

Estimated Range of Awards: up to \$4,000

<u>Opportunity: Freedom to Read Foundation -- Judith Krug</u> <u>Fund Banned Books Week Event Grants</u>

Due Date: April 30, 2024

Eligible Applicants: Schools, nonprofit organizations, and libraries are encouraged to apply. To be eligible, you must not have been a recipient of an FTRF grant within the past five years.

Purpose: Each year the Freedom to Read Foundation (FTRF) distributes grants to organizations to support activities that raise awareness of intellectual freedom and censorship issues during the annual Banned Books Weeks celebration (September 22-28, 2024). Grants are evaluated based on the following criteria: imagination, schedule/action plan, pr plan, budget, and evaluation.

Estimated Range of Awards: \$1,000

Opportunity: ACS-Hach High School Chemistry Classroom Grant

Due Date: June 1, 2024

Eligible Applicants: Applicants must be a high school chemistry educator teaching in the U.S.

Purpose: Since 2008, over 700 high school chemistry teachers received ACS-Hach High School Chemistry Classroom Grants to support ideas that enhance classroom learning, foster student development, and reveal the wonders of chemistry. Grants may fund laboratory equipment & supplies, instructional materials, professional development, and student-conducted field studies.

Estimated Range of Awards: Up to \$1800

<u>Opportunity: Karma for Cara Community Service</u> <u>Youth MicroGrant Program</u>

Due Date: July 1st, October 1st, January 1st, & April 1st

Eligible Applicants: Students 18 years of age and under. Must have a teacher/adult advisor for their project.

Purpose: Students may apply to complete service projects in their communities throughout the United States.

Estimated Range of Awards: between \$250-\$1,000

Note: They do not fund stipends, facility rentals, or transportation costs.

Opportunity: Leveling the Playing Field

Due Date: Rolling Basis

Eligible Applicants: K-12 schools and nonprofits serving economically

disadvantaged youth

Purpose: Leveling the Playing Field furnishes schools and community organizations with free new and gently-used sports equipment enabling those groups to provide affordable and accessible youth sports activities for their children who otherwise would not have such opportunities.

Estimated Range of Awards: Access to their warehouse space to take new and gently-used equipment on a continuous basis

Opportunity: Lovett Fund for Elementary Drama

Due Date: Rolling basis, beginning in August of each school year

Eligible Applicants: Elementary Educators, 501c3s

Purpose: Funding is available for the production of plays and musicals performed

by elementary school students (grades 1–5) in a school program.

Estimated Range of Awards: \$300

Purpose: TFBP provides new books to children in need addressing one of the most important factors affecting literacy – access to books. TFBP supplies books to schools, after-school programs and other organizations that already have the tools to teach and use the books for lessons, and then the books go home with the kids so they can share the joy of reading with their family and friends. All books distributed by First Book are brand new and are provided at no cost to the child.

Opportunity: Toshiba America Foundation

Due Date: Ongoing

Eligible Applicants: Teachers of grades 6-12

Purpose: Toshiba America Foundation (TAF) grants fund the projects ideas and materials teachers need to innovate in their science, technology, engineering and math classrooms. TAF is interested in funding innovative projects designed by teachers or small teams of teachers for use in their own schools and classroom. Applications must be for project based learning.

They do not consider requests for computer hardware (including computers, laptops, and tablets). Summer programs, after-school projects, and independent study projects are not eligible for funding.

Estimated Range of Awards: Applications for less than \$5,000 are due 6/1, 9/1, 12/1, and 3/1. Applications for grants of more than \$5,000 are due 5/1 and 11/1.
