Hispanic Heritage Month 2020 kicked off on Tuesday, September 15, and ends on October 15. September 15 is a historically significant day which marks the anniversary of the independence of five Latin American countries: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua. During this month we celebrate and recognize the history, contribution, and culture of the U.S. Latinx and Hispanic communities.

Fun facts you might no know! Did you know...

- The term Hispanic or Latino (or the more recent term Latinx) refers to a person's culture or origin—regardless of race.
- The Hispanic population of the US as of July 1, 2019, is 60.6 million making people of Hispanic origin the nation's largest ethnic or racial minority. Hispanics constituted 18.5% of the nation's total population.
- Pennsylvania is one of the 12 states with a population of 1 million or more Hispanic residents in 2019
- In 2018, 71% of Latinos ages 5 and older spoke English proficiently, up from 59% in 2000.
- A record 32 million Latinos are projected to be eligible to vote in 2020, up from 27.3 million in 2016.
