



There are seven (7) special admission middle schools in The School District of Philadelphia. Each special admission middle school has its own set of admissions criteria related to attendance, punctuality, behavior, grades and standardized test scores. These schools are also designed to offer specialized instruction to students with particular talents and/or interests. The specialized instruction is incorporated in the regular basic school curriculum. What make them unique are emphasis on specialized courses of study and the focus on accepting students from all areas of the city. School admission teams select students for admission who best meet the schools' admissions criteria. Please note that all qualified applicants may not be admitted due to space limitations.

CRITERIA FOR ADMISSION

Academic: Selection of students in grade four who will be promoted into grade five with grades no lower than a C in any major subject. A local percentile of 70 on the PSSA, or a comparable score on another nationally recognized standardized test, is the minimum requirement to be considered for admission. Preference will be given to North Region students.

Behavior: Positive behavior comments in all areas.

Attendance: Student must have 95% attendance/punctuality.

Reference: Letter of recommendation from teacher

Parental Support: Permission and support will be required by the parents.

Experience: Student should have had 1-2 years formal training playing a musical instrument.

Audition: Student will be required to audition, and attendance by both the student and parent/guardian is required at the interview/testing session.

Students who have expressed an interest in music should apply.

The school uses the School-wide Enrichment model to deliver mentally gifted services. High expectations are in place for all students. The Power Hour program is offered to all students who fall below the seventieth percentile.

- 1. Criteria for selection of students in grades 5 & 6 will be based on report card grades, reading and math scores on the PSSA test or comparable scores on another nationally recognized standardized test, and any other criteria specified by the school. Minimum standardized test scores to qualify for admission:
 - Grade 5: 65th local percentile ranking in the reading and math sections of the PSSA or other standardized test.
 - Grade 6: 70th local percentile ranking in the reading and math sections of the PSSA or other standardized test.
- 2. Excellent Report Card Grades for the previous two years indicating all "A's" and "B's."
- 3. Attendance rate of 90% or better, with a minimum number of latenesses is required.
- 4. Positive behavior comments in all areas
- 5. Each applicant must be able to attend an interview and testing session at the Hill-Freedman Middle School. Notification of this session will be provided by the sending school. A parent/legal guardian must accompany the applicant to the interview.

Masterman is a middle and senior high school serving culturally diverse, academically talented students in Grades 5-12. Students come from all parts of the city, public and private schools; consideration is given to ensuring a desegregated student population. Students are generally admitted to Masterman in 5th grade. Ninety percent of the students selected for admission to Masterman High School, a college preparatory program for approximately 350 outstanding students are selected from Masterman Middle School.

All Masterman teachers are "demonstration" teachers and are expected to provide an enriched and accelerated curriculum. They are also expected to support students' involvement in curriculum related activities.

In the middle school, the language curriculum is literature based. The fifth grade curriculum is enriched with art, music, Latin, physical education and health education. The sixth grade curriculum also includes computer instruction, home economics, art and music.

Masterman provides opportunities for interaction between the middle and high school students. Activities include Project T.E.E.N (peer counseling by high school students using skits), interactive activities for health education classes, peer assistant coaches, multi-cultural programs and peer tutoring/mentoring.

There are also numerous athletic and extracurricular activities which include: national championship chess and sports teams, foreign language and math competitions, the "PennLines" science club and PRIME science fairs, bank, choir and orchestra. The school participates in numerous contests and trips, offers computer activities, drama and has a school yearbook and newspaper.

In addition to the arts, the seventh grade students take an introductory course in foreign language and then select a full year of French or Spanish for eighth grade. Seventh grade students with exceptional ability in mathematics are tested for placement in a special class of Algebra I while most students take a transition algebra class. The seventh grade algebra students take geometry in eighth grade, Algebra II upon entry into high school, and calculus in grade eleven. Eighth grade students also study earth and physical science in preparation for ninth grade biology.

The school determines admission decisions. Please note that all qualified applicants may not be admitted due to space limitations.

Most students are admitted to Masterman in the fifth grade although there are some limited admissions in the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades. Only 99 students are admitted in ninth grade; most come from Masterman Middle School. A few outstanding candidates from outside Masterman Middle School may be wait-listed for grade nine if there is room, however, one full year of either French or Spanish and Algebra are required to apply.

- 1. A local percentile of 88 on the PSSA, or a comparable score on another nationally recognized standardized test, is the minimum requirement to be considered for admission. Scores are usually much higher for admission. Both the Total Reading and Total Math scores are considered.
- 2. All A's and B's are required to apply. All grading systems other than letter or numerical grades must be translated into letter grades.
- 3. Positive behavior comments in all areas.
- 4. Good attendance and punctuality is required.

SCHOOL VISITATION

Prospective parents' meetings are held in the fall, and are usually scheduled in October. They last approximately one and one-half hours, and include an information session and short tour of the school. The meeting is designed for parents and not for students. There is an Open House for students and parents in the spring after the admissions process has been completed. An Orientation Day occurs prior to school opening for all students who were admitted.
