

District Focus Series: District-wide Survey

Teacher, Student, and Parent/Guardian Perspectives on School Safety and Climate, 2015-16 to 2017-18

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Each year, the Office of Research and Evaluation includes questions about school safety and climate on the District-wide surveys administered to parent/guardians, teachers, students, and principals in District and Charter schools. Results from the surveys are used to inform school, sector, and citywide improvement efforts.¹

This brief summarizes District-wide survey responses related to safety and climate from students, parents, and teachers in both District and Charter schools. Climate refers to the things that affect how school community members feel about their school, like school mission and vision, respectful relationships, student safety and support, and challenges to student learning.

Research Questions

The following research questions were examined for survey respondents from both District and Charter schools:

- 1. What do teacher and student survey respondents report about school safety in District and Charter schools?
- 2. What do teacher, student, and parent/guardian survey respondents report about school climate in District and Charter schools?

Data and Methods

Three years of responses to the District-wide teacher, student, and parent/guardian surveys were used to answer the research questions (2015-16 to 2017-18). Response rates for the survey in 2017-18 were 54% for students, 54% for teachers, and 17% for parents. These response rates for students and parents are an increase from previous years (Table 1).

¹ Since 2015, District-wide surveys have been administered annually to students, parents/guardians, teachers, and principals. Each year, the Office of Research and Evaluation (ORE) carefully plans the timing and duration of the administration windows for each of the surveys to optimize participant access and response rates across the district and charter sectors. For this brief, we analyzed responses to individual questions³ about perceptions of safety and groups of questions about school climate.⁴ With one exception, results to individual questions are reported as the percent of "most positive" responses. For example, in response to the student question, "I feel safe in my classes," the most positive response is "most or all of the time." The one exception is for a question asking teachers about how great of a challenge school crime/safety is in their perspective.

Results are presented separately for grade levels (3-8, 9-12, K-8) when possible. Tables detailing the number and percentages of most positive responses for each survey question can be found in Appendix A.

Findings

School Safety

Although a higher percentage of Charter student respondents in grades 3-8 reported feeling safe in class most or all of the time, both District and Charter schools experienced a slight decrease in this percentage between 2015-2016 and 2017-2018 (Figure 1).



²Parent/Guardian and Student response percentages are based on student enrollment records as of May 31. Teacher response percentages are based on District teachers with an "active status" on record as of May 31. For charter school teachers, the response percentage is based on the emails provided by Charter schools during the survey administration period. 
⁴ Groups of survey questions are often analyzed together when they represent the same "construct" or underlying theme or topic. Construct scores are generally used when analyzing survey data because asking multiple questions about the same topic is a better way to find out what people really think rather than just relying on one question. In this brief, the climate construct score is the combination of responses to multiple questions that ask about school climate.

Figure 1. For survey respondents in grades 3-8, a higher percentage of Charter students reported feeling safe in class most or all of the time when compared to District student responses




Results were similar for high schools, with a higher percentage of Charter student respondents having reported feeling safe in class most or all of the time, and a decrease for both District and Charter students in these percentages between 2015-2016 and 2017-2018 (Figure 2).

Figure 2. For survey respondents in high school, a higher percentage of Charter students reported feeling safe in their class most or all of the time when compared to District student responses


Figure 3. For teacher respondents with K-8 students in their schools,⁵ a greater percentage of District teachers reported school crime/safety as a great challenge as compared to Charter teachers who responded to the survey

The teacher survey includes a question that asks to what extent school crime/safety is a challenge to student learning in their school. A much higher percentage (19%) of District teacher respondents with K-8 students in their schools indicated school crime/safety was a great challenge compared to Charter teacher respondents (4%). Although both groups have experienced declines in these percentages since 2015-2016, the disparity in responses between District and Charter students has existed for all three years (Figure 3).

⁵ Respondents included teachers at schools with any of the grades from K-8. This includes schools that serve grades 6-12 or another combination of middle and high school grade levels.

Although a similar pattern existed between District and Charter high school teacher respondents in 2015-2016, survey results in 2017-18 showed a slightly higher percentage (18%) of Charter teachers reporting school crime/safety as a great challenge compared to District high school teachers (17%) (Figure 4).

Figure 4. For teacher respondents in high schools, a greater percentage of District teachers reported school crime/safety as a great challenge, however this disparity has greatly decreased between 2015-2016 and 2017-2018



School Climate




Figure 6. For teacher respondents, a higher percentage of Charter teachers selected the most positive response choice for the climate construct when compared to District teacher responses





Figure 7. For parent/guardian respondents, a higher percentage of Charter parent/guardians selected the most positive response choice for the climate construct when compared to District parent/guardian responses

The following results refer to responses to the overall climate construct questions pertaining to bullying, belonging, and safety. Reported are the percentage of the most positive response options for students (Figure 5), teachers (Figure 6), and parent/guardians (Figure 7). For all three years, a higher percentage of Charter students, teachers, and parent/guardians selected the most positive response option compared to District students, teachers, and parent/guardians. In 2017-18, the greatest disparity is seen for teacher respondents, with 35% of Charter teachers selecting the most positive response option compared to 28% of District teachers. Slightly smaller disparities exist for students and parent/guardian respondents.

Figure 5. For student respondents, a higher percentage of Charter students selected the most positive response choice for the climate construct when compared to District student responses
