

Graduation Rates for First Time 9th Grade Students in 2014-15 and Matriculation Rates for 2018 Graduates

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This brief presents an analysis of four-year graduation rates of students who entered 9th grade for the first time in the 2014-15 school year and first fall matriculation rates of 2017-18 high school graduates in 2-year and 4-year post-secondary institutions.¹ The graduation analysis includes 15,938 students who were first time 9th graders in 2014-15 at a District or Charter² school.³ The matriculation analysis includes 10,620 students who graduated from a District or Charter school in 2017-18, regardless of whether they graduated in 4, 5, or 6 years.⁴ For both analyses, overall graduation and matriculation rates were also examined by race/ethnicity and gender.

Research Questions

Two sets of questions guided the analyses:

- What percentage of the 2014-15 first-time 9th grade cohort of students graduated high school in four years? How did graduation rates differ between 2014-15 first-time 9th grade cohort students of different race/ethnicity-gender groups?
- 2. What percentage of students who graduated in the 2017-18 school year matriculated in a 2or 4-year post-secondary institution in the fall semester following their high school graduation? How did matriculation rates of students who graduated in 2017-18 differ with respect to race/ethnicity-gender groups?

Methods

Graduation Analyses

To answer the first research question, a list of all students who were first time 9th graders in 2014-15 was identified. Last school of record and graduation status at the end of summer 2018 were noted for each student.⁵ The list of students was then divided into two groups based on whether the last school of record was a District or Charter school. Overall graduation rates include District Alternative Programs and Cyber Charter schools. Rates were also calculated for District,

¹ First fall matriculation means that students who graduated in the spring/summer (in this case, 2018) were enrolled in a 2- or 4-year postsecondary institution the next fall (in this case, 2018).

Alternative, Charter, and Cyber Charter schools separately. Finally, graduation rate was calculated for the demographic cross-section of gender and race/ethnicity for both sectors separately.

Matriculation Analyses

To answer the second research question, a list of all students who graduated high school in 2017-18 (regardless of how many years they were in high school) was compiled. National Student Clearinghouse (NSC) data was used to identify students who matriculated in a 2 or 4-year post-secondary institution in the fall semester of 2018. The list of students was then divided into two groups based on whether the school of graduation was a District or Charter school. Matriculation rate was calculated for the demographic cross-section of race/ethnicity and gender, separately for the District and Charter sectors.

Findings

Graduation Rates for the 2014-15 First Time 9th Grade Cohort

Overall Graduation Rates




Figure 1. Overall 4-Year Graduation Rate for All District and Charter Schools in Philadelphia a

In 2018, students enrolled in District schools (including Alternative Programs) had a higher overall graduation rate (69%) compared to students enrolled in Charter schools (including Cyber Charters) (66%) (Figure 1). The Philadelphia city-wide graduation rate was 68%.




Figure 2. Four-Year Graduation Rates for SDP Alternative Programs and Cyber Charter Schools a

When Alternative Programs and Cyber Charters were removed from the District and Charter sector rates, Charter schools had a higher overall graduation rate in 2018 (81%) compared to students enrolled in District schools (79%). The graduation rate for Alternative Programs was 28% and Cyber Charters was 14% (Figure 2). The four-year graduation rate for Renaissance Charter schools was 68% (not shown in figures).

Graduation Rates by Race/Ethnicity and Gender

Looking at four-year graduation rates for race/ethnicity and gender combined, we found that female student graduation rates were consistently higher than male student graduation rates across sectors, with the gender gap being higher in District schools (76% of female students graduated compared to 61% of male students) than Charter schools (70% of female students graduated compared to 61% of male students). While male student graduation rates were similar across sectors (61%), female student graduation rates were lower in Charter schools (70%) than District schools (76%).

Among District students, Hispanic/Latino males had the lowest graduation rate (56%) across all race/ethnicity-gender categories, followed by Black/African American males (58%). Asian female District students had the highest graduation rate (92%) followed by Asian male students (85%), White female students (79%), and Black/African American female students (75%).

In Charter schools, Multiracial/Other students, both male and female, had the lowest graduation rates, at 24% and 32% respectively. Charter school student graduation rates were highest for Asian female students (79%), followed by Hispanic/Latina females and Asian males (both 76%). Full

results for District schools (including Alternative Programs) and Charter schools (including Renaissance Charter schools and Cyber Charters) are presented in Table 1 on page 6.

Matriculation of 2018 Graduates

Overall Matriculation Rates




Figure 3. Overall First-Fall College Matriculation Rate for District and Charter Schools a

First-fall college matriculation rates in fall 2018 were comparable for District (excluding Alternative Programs) and Charter (including Renaissance Charters) school graduates (55% of graduates)⁶ (Figure 3). When matriculation rates for Alternative Programs and Renaissance Charter schools were analyzed separately, we found the overall first-fall college matriculation rate in fall 2018 to be 31% for Renaissance Charter school graduates and 14% for Alternative Program graduates.

Matriculation Rates by Race/Ethnicity and Gender

First-fall college matriculation rates for 2018 graduates were analyzed by race/ethnicity and gender. As was the case with graduation rate, college matriculation rate was consistently higher among female students across both sectors. The gender gap was similar across sectors: 14 percentage points for District schools and 13 percentage points for Charter schools.

⁶ The NSC data available for this analysis did not include information about Cyber Charter graduates. Therefore, they were not included in any of the matriculation rate analyses.

Across both District and Charter sectors, in fall 2018, Hispanic/Latino and Black/African American male students had the lowest matriculation rates, in that order. Female Hispanic/Latina students also had lower rates of matriculation compared to female students of other race/ethnicity groups (48% for District schools and 52% for Charter schools).

For District schools, Asian female students had the highest first-time fall matriculation rate (82%) while in Charter schools White female students had the highest rate at 80%. Full results are presented in Table 2 on page 7.
