

Results from Graduate Follow-up Survey Completed by Seniors who Graduated in 2018

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Why the Graduate Follow-up Survey?

- The Pennsylvania Department of Education requires each District to administer an exit survey to seniors. The primary purpose of this "Senior Exit Survey" is to capture students' intentions after high school—specifically, whether they are planning to obtain additional education, employment, or to pursue other activities.
- In recent years, Senior Exit Survey respondents from the School District of Philadelphia (SDP) were asked to volunteer their contact information (email and/or cell phone number) for the purposes of receiving a follow-up survey one year after graduation (93% of those surveyed provided contact information).

What is the Graduate Follow-up Survey?

- The Graduate Follow-up Survey is designed to:
 - Better understand education and career pursuits of recent SDP high school graduates.
 - Learn about obstacles students faced in achieving post-graduation plans as initially indicated on the Senior Exit Survey.
 - Understand whether students who intended to work post-graduation have made smooth transitions to the workforce.

Graduate Follow-up Survey Methods

In the winter of 2019-2020, ORE administered new, customized Graduate Follow-up Surveys using the Qualtrics online survey platform to three separate groups of students via email and/or SMS to students who had previously provided their contact information on the Senior Exit Survey.

- Class of 2018 Respondents –Initial Attempt at Contact (Students who graduated in 2018, 1-year post-high school graduation). This group's responses are the focus of the findings presented in this slide deck.
- Class of 2017 Respondents—Second Contact (Students who graduated in 2017, 2-years posthigh school graduation, previously responded to the Graduate Follow-Up Survey during the 2018-19 administration window)
- Class of 2017 Respondents—Second Attempt at Contact (Students who graduated in 2017 (2-years post-high school graduation who were contacted previously but did <u>not</u> respond to the Graduate Follow Up Survey during the 2018-19 administration window)

Graduate Follow-up Survey Methods

- All Graduate Follow-up Survey responses were linked with student's Senior Exit Survey responses. Students who had previously intended to pursue education were asked education related questions and those who had previously intended to pursue work were asked work related questions.
- This slide deck will explore findings for Seniors who graduated from SDP in 2018 (First-time Class of 2018 Respondents). Results from other groups will be published separately.

Survey Completion

Overview: Graduate Survey Completion

- The Graduate Follow Up Survey opened October 28, 2019 and closed December 20, 2019 (Fall 2019 Semester)
- Students were entered into a raffle to win a \$10 gift card upon completing the survey
- 946 of 5,325 students who were successfully contacted by email and/or SMS (text) provided a valid response (17.8% overall response rate)




ORE cannot determine if SMS messages were successfully delivered so the SMS response rate may be underestimated.

Graduate Follow-up Survey Respondent Characteristics




Total completed responses from Class of 2018 seniors.

11.9% Percent of Class of 2018 seniors who responded to the Graduate Follow-Up Survey.






Female students represented about half of all Class of 2018 District Seniors, but about 66% of those who took the Graduate Follow-up Survey.


Class of 2018 African American and Hispanic respondents were underrepresented on the Graduate Follow-up Survey, while White and Asian respondents were overrepresented.

*Seniors who respond to the Senior Exit Survey (and are therefore eligible to take the Graduate Follow-up Survey) may not be fully representative of all District seniors. 
Summary- Representativeness

- The Graduate Follow-up survey sample is probably not representative of the full population of Class of 2018 seniors.
- For the Class of 2018, 11.9% of Seniors completed the Survey.
- Compared to the full population of seniors, survey respondents were more likely to:
 - Be Female
 - Be White or Asian
 - Have reported intent to pursue postsecondary education on the Senior Exit Survey
 - Have enrolled in college after graduating high school

Education and Employment After High School


Are you currently enrolled in school?

Among all Graduate Follow-up Survey respondents from the Class of 2018 (n=946), 77.1% indicated that they were currently enrolled in college.




When did you first enroll in this school?

Among all survey respondents from the Class of 2018 who reported that they were currently enrolled in college (n=729), most (74.1%) first enrolled in the fall following their high school graduation.




As of today, how many course credits have you successfully earned?




Among all survey respondents from the Class of 2018 who reported that they were currently enrolled in college (n=729), most (65.2%) reported having earned 29.1 to 59 credits (sophomore equivalent).

Which of the following best describes your major field of study?



Among all survey respondents from the Class of 2018 who reported that they were currently enrolled in college (n=729), 26.1% indicated that they are pursuing Health and Medicine as their major.


In addition to school, which option best describes your current job status?




Among respondents who were currently enrolled in school (n=729), over half reported they were working at least part-time and 13.3% reported working full-time while enrolled in school.

Are you currently enrolled in school?

Among all Graduate Follow-up Survey respondents from the Class of 2018 (n=946), 22.9% indicated that they were not currently enrolled in school.




Which of the following best describes your current status?




Among all survey respondents who responded that they were NOT currently enrolled in school (n=217), more than half were working full-time.

Were you ever enrolled in any education programs after high school (such as college, technical training, or an apprenticeship)?




Among all survey respondents from the Class of 2018 who responded that they were NOT currently enrolled in college (n=217), 43.3% reported that they were previously enrolled in college.

Do you plan on beginning any post-high school education, such as college, technical training, or an apprenticeship, within the next year?




Among all survey respondents from the Class of 2018 who responded that they were NOT currently enrolled in college (n=217), 69.1% reported that they planned on beginning college within the next year.

Among respondents intending school within the next year (n=150), 40.7% planned on attending a 4-year college or university.


Which of the following best describes your work?



Among all students who reported that they work (n=644), the highest percentage reported working in the retail/sales field. A higher percentage of students that both work and attend school (n=486) work in retail/sales, food services, office, and technical fields compared to those who only work (n=158).


Postsecondary Obstacles

Before graduating from high school you took a senior exit survey indicating your post-high school education plans. As of now, would you say that you...





Did you experience any obstacles after high school that made it more difficult for you to achieve your original plans of pursuing your educational field?





Which of the following best describe the obstacle(s) you faced in pursuing education after high school? (Respondents could select more than one)




Among students who reported experiencing an obstacle in pursuing the education field indicated on the Senior Exit Survey (n=410), nearly half (49.3%) reported that not having enough money and/or financial aid was an obstacle.

Summary of Survey Results

Conclusions

- 946 students from the Class of 2018 completed the Graduate Follow-up Survey, representing 17.8% of those who received the survey and 11.9% of the graduating class.
- 77.1% of Class of 2018 respondents indicated that they were currently enrolled in school.
- Of all respondents who intended to work, only 50% report achieving or having started achieving their high school plans compared to 76.3% of seniors who intended education.
- Approximately half of all students who responded to the Graduate Follow-up Survey reported experiencing obstacles after HS that interfered with plans.
- Not enough money and/or financial aid to pay for college was the single largest obstacle reported for students who intended to pursue postsecondary education on the Senior Exit Survey (49.3% of students who intended education and reported obstacle).
