Renewal Overview

The recommendation to renew a charter for a subsequent five-year period is based on a comprehensive review of three domains:

1) Academic Success

Trend, proficiency, growth, graduation

2) Organizational Viability and Compliance

Mission, special education, English Language Learners, admissions, discipline,
 Board governance, personnel requirements, food and health services, required documentation

3) Financial Health and Sustainability

Financial health, generally accepted standards of fiscal management



Renewal Overview

Each of the three domains is rated as Meets Standard, Approaches Standard or Does Not Meet Standard.

Academic success is a primary consideration for charter renewal; a charter school that does not meet the standard for academic success will be considered for nonrenewal regardless of ratings in the other two domains.

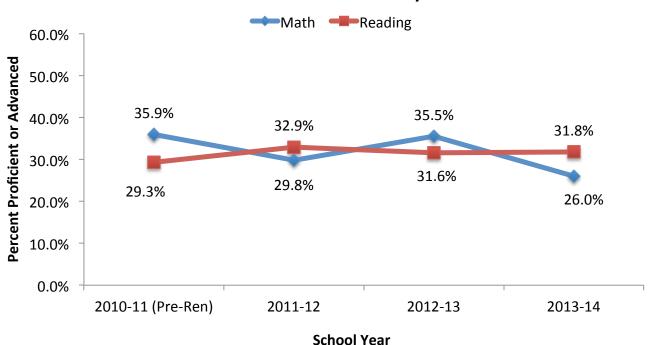

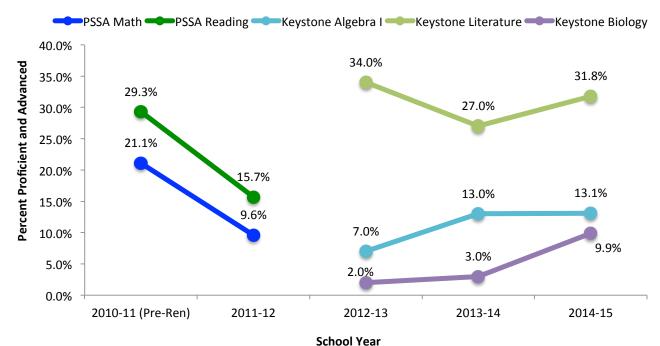
