

**THE SCHOOL DISTRICT OF PHILADELPHIA  
MEETING OF THE SCHOOL REFORM COMMISSION**

**MAY 25, 2017**

A public meeting was held by the School Reform Commission on May 25, 2017 in the Auditorium of the School District of Philadelphia Education Center, 440 North Broad Street. The meeting was convened at 4:32 p.m. by Chair Wilkerson.

Chair Wilkerson stated that tonight's meeting will focus on the critical business of adopting a budget for the 2017-18 school year. She stated that there will also be general business on our agenda this evening which includes action on the resubmission of the Deep Roots new charter application, and that the Charter Schools Office will make a presentation. Citing resolutions SRC-1, SRC-2, SRC-3, IU-1, and IU-2, Chair Wilkerson stated that these are the resolutions which will formalize the adoption of our budgets. She stated that Chief Financial Officer, Uri Monson, will present on them in detail. Chair Wilkerson stated that while these resolutions refer to the publically accessible and publically presented District budget overviews and Lump sum statement, they have been added within the last 48 hours and will be considered walk-on resolutions. She stated that additionally, there has been a revision to the proposed lease term for resolution A-2 Amendment of Lease Agreement for Science Leadership Academy, and that this resolution will also be considered a walk-on. Chair Wilkerson stated that pursuant to SRC policy on public participation, if you would like to register to speak on the topic of one of these walk-on resolutions, please register now with Tracy, who is standing in the back of the room. She stated that their names will be added to the end of the speaker's list after all pre-registered speakers have completed their comments, and that individuals that have already registered to speak on other topics, may address the walk-on resolutions in your allotted 3 minutes.

Miles Shore, Interim General Counsel stated that the School Reform Commission met in Executive Session on May 22, 2107 and today, prior to the public meeting to discuss quasi-judicial proceedings.

Zachary Epps, Office of the Superintendent, stated that at every School Reform Commission meeting, a representative from the Deaf-Hearing Communication Center is here to provide sign language interpretation of the proceedings. He also stated that representatives from the Office of Family and Community Engagement are stationed in the lobby to help with interpretation services. Mr. Epps stated that the proceedings of this SRC meeting are being streamed live on the Internet at [www.philasd.org/live](http://www.philasd.org/live) and can be seen on PSTV's Comcast Channel 52 and Verizon Fios Channel 20. He stated that the proceedings are also being recorded by The School District of Philadelphia and that the School District's recordings are protected by the Copyright Laws of the United States and may not be used in any manner without the express written consent of The School District. Mr. Epps stated that by participating in tonight's meeting, members of the public acknowledge that the School District may use its recordings for any purpose without obtaining permission or paying any compensation.

Dr. Hite provided remarks. Dr. Hite stated that last Friday, he had the privilege to join regional leaders at Hon. Luis Muñoz Marín Elementary as part of the Read to Me Early Literacy Storyteller Event, sponsored by The Chamber of Commerce for Greater Philadelphia. He stated that students at 24 elementary schools and pre-K centers across The School District of Philadelphia were visited by reading volunteers as part of the event, which is designed to inspire students to read with their parents, caregivers and teachers throughout the school year. He stated that the Read to Me Early Literacy Storyteller Event is part of a year-long initiative that provides quality classroom book collections to our city's pre-K and kindergarten students. Dr. Hite thanked Joe Meterchick, Regional President of Philadelphia, Delaware and Southern New Jersey, PNC Bank; Rob Wonderling, President and CEO, The Chamber of Commerce for Greater Philadelphia; and the countless volunteers who took time out of their busy schedules to read to our students.

Dr. Hite stated that before the Commission tonight are two resolutions, A-1 and A-2, for lease extensions of 1 year for Science Leadership Academy and for 3 years at Constitution High School. He stated that these two lease

extensions would allow the School District to better plan as we work to find a more permanent long-term home for both of these award-winning schools that will enable both to continue their unique and successful missions.

Dr. Hite stated that last Sunday was the seventh annual Philadelphia Burger Brawl, which helps support the Fund for The School District of Philadelphia's Right Books Campaign. He stated that over 2,500 people attended and chefs from more than 40 leading area restaurants were on hand to offer samples from over 60 types of burgers, tacos, and wings. Those who took part were able to vote for their favorite. Dr. Hite stated that the money raised will be used to provide K-3 classrooms throughout the District with comprehensive literacy training for teachers, literacy coaches, and classroom libraries with books curated by literacy experts. He extended Thanks to the restaurants who participated and donated their time and skills, and restaurateur Rob Wasserman who once again did a terrific job organizing and hosting the event. Our thanks to everyone who attended and supported early literacy efforts for our students.

Dr. Hite provided an update on the bus accident involving students and teachers from the Charles W. Henry School. He reported that over the weekend, two more students were released from the hospital. Dr. Hite stated that [we] are still sending thoughts and prayers to those who remain in the hospital -- two students and a teacher, Brittany Jacobs -- as well as to their families and the school community. He stated that the School District's Office of Prevention and Intervention continues to work with the school to offer counseling for students, staff, parents and families, and the school will continue to have District staff on-site, including counselors, school psychologists, a Prevention and Intervention Specialist, and representatives from the Office of Family and Community Engagement. Dr. Hite acknowledged Principal Fatima Rogers and her amazing staff for working to support our students and the school community.

Dr. Hite stated that all District schools and administrative offices will be closed this coming Monday for Memorial Day, and hoped that all of us will take a moment, in our own way, to honor those who died while serving.

Dr. Hite introduced Uri Monson, Chief Financial Officer, who provided a presentation on the FY 18 budget.

Mr. Monson's presentation included a review of the FY18 Lump Sum Statement adopted on March 23, 2017, and changes since its adoption, a review of the 2016-17 amended and 2017-18 adopted budget summary; five-year plan projections, Action Plan 3.0 goals, investments, and next steps.

DawnLynne Kacer, Executive Director, Charter Schools Office, provided an overview of the Deep Roots Charter School Revised Application. The presentation included an overview of the regulatory requirements, the application resubmission, additions/changes to the application, and approval guidelines for new charter applications.

The meeting was opened to the public for presentation of statements.

Mr. Shore announced the applicable provisions of the SRC's public participation policy.

The following individuals requested that the School Reform Commission postpone the vote on resolution A-2:

Camille Jones and Ella Burrows, 11<sup>th</sup> grade students at Science Leadership Academy stated that location of the school is crucial.

Dr. Hite stated that extending the lease for Science Leadership Academy will give the District two years to identify a suitable location.

The Honorable Helen Gym, City Councilmember-at-Large, stated that all children in Philadelphia deserve schools that give them the resources that need to flourish. She called for a budget that prioritizes equity as well as adequacy at its center. Councilwoman Gym thanked the District, especially the finance office for being strong partners in that effort. She outlined funding priorities, inclusive of addressing racial inequity in instrumental music, counselors, social workers, behavioral health, and BCAs.

Tomika Anglin stated that there is no higher priority than the teachers' contract.

Mama Gail stated that Dr. Hite needs to go.

Robin Lowry expressed concerns about the School District spending money on tests and not for student play.

Niya Wise, student, West Philadelphia High School, expressed concerns about the development of the School Police Officer Student Complaint Process and the involvement of students in its development.

Linda Gordy, parent, stated that the School District needs to develop plans that address emergency situations.

Greg Paulmier, parent, suggested that the School District only transport students in buses with seatbelts.

Alec Webster, parent, Fitzpatrick School, expressed concerns about the lack on cleanliness of buses.

John Tremble questioned and expressed concerns about the School Reform Commission possibly voting on and approving an inadequate budget.

Leah Clouden expressed opposition to the extension of the lease agreements for Constitution High School (A-1) and Science Leadership Academy (A-2).

Eileen Duffy expressed concerns about an unelected, state imposed board controlling [our] schools. She invited the public to attend a forum on June 7, 2017 about what the SRC means for teachers, students, families and residents of Philadelphia.

Diane Payne suggested that the SRC prepare to vote to abolish the Harrisburg imposed School Reform Commission.

Karel Kilimnik requested that Deep Roots Charter School be denied a charter.

Aminata Sy, parent, urged the School District to hire the necessary teachers and staff to support struggling students of African roots.

Lynda Rubin, citing the failure of reform programs and charter initiatives all over the country, stated that Philadelphia public schools can't afford to continue starving [our] own schools and their students while opening and renewing charter schools.

Alison Stohr expressed concerns about the sale of the former Smith School building.

In response to Commissioner Green, Fran Burn, Chief Operating Officer, provided a rationale for the proposed lease extension for Science Leadership Academy (A-2)

**SRC-4 (*Updated 5.25.17*)**

**Proposed Action on Revised Charter Application – Deep Roots Charter School**

WHEREAS, on or about November 15, 2016, an application ("Application") was submitted for Deep Roots Charter School to the Charter Schools Office of The School District of Philadelphia ("School District") to start a charter school and public hearings were held on the Application in December 2016 and January 2017; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution SRC-1, approved on February 8, 2017, the School Reform Commission ("SRC") denied the Application; and

WHEREAS, on April 10, 2017, a Revised Application was submitted to the Charter Schools Office; now be it

RESOLVED, that, pursuant to the representations, statements and materials contained in the Application, the Revised Application and the concluding document submitted by Deep Roots Charter School and made during the public hearings by representatives for Deep Roots Charter School, the SRC hereby grants a Charter to "Deep Roots Charter School" to operate a public charter school serving Kindergarten through Grade 8 for a five-year period commencing on July 1, 2018 and ending on June 30, 2023, provided that Deep Roots Charter School ("Charter School") submits the following documentation ("Required Documentation") to the Charter Schools Office no later than December 31, 2017:

1. A Code of Student Conduct compliant with all Pennsylvania Public School Code Chapter 12 requirements, in a form acceptable to the Charter Schools Office;
2. An Admissions Policy and Process which complies with the Public School Code and Charter School Law and which includes provisions on application deadlines, recruitment communications, including details on methods to be used to recruit students in an applicable attendance zone, lottery preferences, requested or required enrollment documents, lottery dates, and results, in a form that is acceptable to the Charter Schools Office. The Admissions Policy and Process shall provide that if seats open during the school year or between school years for Kindergarten through Grade 8, the Charter School shall accept new students from the waiting list in appropriate order for particular grades or new applicants if there are no applicants for that grade on the waiting list. The Admissions Policy and Process also shall provide that the Charter School shall provide a copy of its current waiting list at any time during the Term of the Charter within ten (10) business days after requested by the Charter Schools Office;
3. Bylaws adopted by the Charter School Board of Trustees which provide: (i) that all meetings, including emergency and special meetings, of the Board and Board committees shall be held and publicly noticed in accordance with the Sunshine Act; (ii) that actions by committees of the Board shall not constitute action of and cannot bind the Board of Trustees or the Charter School; and (iii) that members of the Board shall not be removed without cause;  
and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Charter School shall submit the following documentation ("Required Documentation") to the Charter Schools Office no later than June 1, 2018:

1. Evidence that the Charter School's school leader identified in the Revised Application holds an administrator certification valid in the state of Pennsylvania or the name, resume and proof of certification for an alternate school leader who is directly employed as a full-time school based leader, certified in Pennsylvania;
2. Evidence that the Charter School has appropriately budgeted for and hired a certified instructional staff consistent with Pennsylvania requirements for staff certification and expected student enrollment levels, including but not limited to English as a Second Language and special education staff; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Charter for the Charter School shall contain the following terms and conditions:

1. The Charter School shall be authorized to operate only as a Kindergarten to Grade 8 charter school starting in the 2018-2019 school year with a maximum enrollment of 300 students in Kindergarten through Grade 4 in 2018-2019, 360 students in Kindergarten through Grade 5 in 2019-2020, 420 students in Kindergarten through Grade 6 in 2020-2021, 480 students in Kindergarten through Grade 7 in 2021-2022, and 540 students in Kindergarten through Grade 8 in 2022-2023 and any renewal of the Charter, unless the parties agree in writing to other terms. Under no circumstances will the Charter School request payment from either the School District or the Pennsylvania Department of Education for more students than set forth herein or enroll students in different grades, without authorization by the SRC by resolution approved at a public meeting;
2. The Charter School shall participate in the School District's charter school performance framework and monitoring system as set forth in the School District charter school policies and procedures and any amendments thereto. The charter school performance framework will include annual evaluations of the Charter School's academic, financial, and organizational performance. The Charter School agrees to submit or allow to be submitted to the Charter Schools Office all student level academic information and any school-level data required for

assessment of academic and organizational performance as part of the charter school performance framework and monitoring system; and

3. If the Charter School achieves a ranking in the bottom two levels on the School District's School Progress Report, or its subsequent replacement, during any year of the term of the Charter, the Charter Schools Office may require that the Charter School meet certain specific student achievement targets and participate in ongoing progress reporting; and

4. If by the end of its third year of operation, as reported after the end of the third school year, the Charter School has not (i) achieved Grade 4 Science PSSA proficiency at or above two of the following three averages: the School District average, the charter school sector average, or the Charter School's SPR Peer Group average (or subsequent peer group developed by the School District), and (ii) demonstrated growth above the Pennsylvania State standard (currently measured by the Average Growth Index (AGI) as  $>-1.0$ ), the Charter School must submit to the Charter Schools Office evidence of data-driven instructional shifts and any planned curricular changes to the Science curriculum; and

5. By June 30, 2019, the Charter School shall submit to the Charter Schools Office a report documenting the percentage of students enrolled in the Charter School as of October 1, 2018 who remained enrolled throughout the 2018-2019 school year; the number of students who received at least one out-of-school suspension during the 2018-2019 school year; the total number of out-of-school suspensions during the 2018-19 school year; and the total number of days of out-of-school suspension during the 2018-19 school year; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the written Charter shall be issued to the Charter School upon the Charter Schools Office's receipt of satisfactory Required Documentation as set forth above, which Charter shall be signed by the Charter School on or before June 1, 2018. The SRC hereby delegates authority to determine compliance with the requirements of this Resolution to the Chief of Staff of the SRC. Failure of the Charter School to submit satisfactory Required Documentation or to sign the Charter by June 1, 2018, or by the end of any extension period granted by the SRC Chief of Staff, shall void this Resolution and shall cause the SRC to re-vote on the Revised Application within thirty (30) days after June 1, 2018, or the expiration of any extension period, whichever is later. Notice of voiding this Resolution for failure to submit the Required Documentation or the signed Charter shall be issued by the Chair of the SRC. Notwithstanding these provisions, the Charter granted herein will not take effect until the written Charter has been signed and delivered by the Chair of the SRC and the Chair of the Charter School's Board of Trustees, or another duly designated member of the Board.

Commissioner McGinley read a statement outlining his concerns about the proposed Deep Roots Charter School.

DawnLynne Kacer, Executive Director, Charter Schools Office, provided a review of the proposed conditions of the charter,

RESOLVED, that the SRC adopts the attached Adjudication as the reasons for its decision to deny the Charter School's Amendment Request.

## **II. EDUCATION SUPPORT SERVICES**

### **A-1 (Added 5.23.17)**

#### **Operating Budget: Amendment of Lease Agreement with 18 South Seventh Street Associates, L.P. – Constitution High School**

RESOLVED, that the School Reform Commission authorizes The School District of Philadelphia, through the Superintendent or his designee, to execute, deliver and perform an amendment of a Lease Agreement originally entered into with 18 South Seventh Street Associates, L.P., pursuant to Resolution No. A-25, approved by the School Reform Commission on April 20, 2005, and extended pursuant to Resolution No. A-26, approved by the School Reform Commission on September 17, 2015, for the lease of the 62,023 square-foot building located at 18 South 7th Street, which the School District uses to operate Constitution High School, by extending the term of the lease from its scheduled expiration date of July 31, 2018 and by increasing the rent for the first year by 2% of the Extended Term, commencing August 1, 2018 through July 31, 2019, to an annual rate of \$1,170,374 (\$18.87 per square foot) and by increasing the rent by 2% for the second year of the Extended Term from August 1, 2019 to July 31, 2020, to an annual rate of \$1,193,781 (\$19.25 per square foot) and by increasing the rent by 2% for the third year of the Extended Term from August 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021 at an annual rate of \$1,217,656 (\$19.62 per square foot). During the Extended Term, the School District also will pay for cleaning and utilities (including water, gas and electric service), for an aggregate amount not to exceed \$500,000. The terms of the amendment must be acceptable to the School District's Office of General Counsel and the Office of Risk Management.

*Description:* Since 2005, the School District has operated the award-winning Constitution High School ("Constitution HS") in the building located at 18 South 7th Street, Philadelphia, PA in a cooperative arrangement with the Constitution Center, which is located nearby. This school serves 425 students in grades 9 through 12. The School District is currently exploring appropriate alternative locations for Constitution HS that will offer the students the benefits they receive at their current location while offering long-term operating cost savings to the School District.

The three-year term is contingent on the School District of Philadelphia Administration presenting a final plan and recommendation for the permanent relocation of Constitution High School by May 2018. The District should also communicate to all incoming and future students that this school will have a different physical location in SY-21-SY-22.

### **A-2 (Updated 5.25.17)**

#### **Operating Budget: Amendment of Lease Agreement with 2130 Arch Street Associates, L.P. – Science Leadership Academy**

Resolved, that the School Reform Commission authorizes The School District of Philadelphia, through the Superintendent or his designee, to execute, deliver and perform an amendment of a Lease Agreement originally entered into with 2130 Arch Street Associates, L.P., pursuant to Resolution No. A-13, approved by the School Reform Commission on November 9, 2005, and extended pursuant to Resolution A-25, approved by the School Reform Commission on September 17, 2015, for the lease of 75,000 square feet in the building located at 2130 Arch

Street, which the School District uses to operate the Science Leadership Academy, by extending the term of the lease from its scheduled expiration date of July 31, 2018 and by increasing the rent by 2% for the first year of the Extended Term, commencing August 1, 2018 through July 31, 2019, to an annual rate of \$1,524,645 (\$20.33 per square foot). During the Extended Term, the School District also will pay for cleaning and utilities (including water, gas and electric service), for an aggregate amount not to exceed \$175,000. The terms of the amendment must be acceptable to the School District's Office of General Counsel and the Office of Risk Management.

*Description:* Since 2005, the School District has operated the award-winning Science Leadership Academy ("SLA") in the building located at 2130 Arch Street, Philadelphia, PA in a cooperative arrangement with the Franklin Institute, which is located nearby. This school serves 500 students in grades 9 through 12. The School District is currently exploring appropriate alternative locations for SLA that will offer the students the benefits they receive at their current location while offering long-term operating cost savings to the School District.

This extension allows the District time to consider permanent options for the physical location of the school and colocation may be considered as one such option. The District should also communicate to all incoming and future students that this school will have a different physical location in SY-19- SY-20.

**WHEREAS**, by Resolution No. SRC-1, approved on March 23, 2017, the School Reform Commission adopted a lump sum statement of anticipated receipts and expenditures for Fiscal Year 2017-2018 for The School District of Philadelphia (the “School District”); and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Section 12-303(a) of the Education Supplement to the Philadelphia Home Rule Charter, the School District must adopt an operating budget for fiscal year commencing on July 1, 2017, in which the total amount of proposed expenditures shall not exceed the amount of funds available for School District purposes; and

**WHEREAS**, changes in revenues and obligations have occurred in the Fiscal Year 2016-2017 budget; now be it

**RESOLVED**, that the School Reform Commission hereby amends and adopts an amended Operating Budget for Fiscal Year 2016-2017 and hereby adopts an Operating Budget for Fiscal Year 2017-2018, as reflected in the estimate of receipts herein set forth in Exhibit B and the estimates of obligations by expenditure area herein set forth in Exhibit C for Fiscal Years 2016-2017 and 2017-2018; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED**, that upon the transfer of any function from one office, department or organizational unit, the Superintendent is authorized to transfer to the successor office, department or organizational unit those portions of the appropriations which pertain to the function transferred; and to transfer funds from undistributed accounts to appropriate departments to implement decisions of the Superintendent, subject to notification to the School Reform Commission, and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Superintendent and the Chief Financial Officer shall certify that each request they bring to the School Reform Commission for the authorization of hiring, contracting, purchasing or any other obligation of School District resources is consistent with the Operating and Capital Budgets that have been adopted by the School Reform Commission, or else they will propose along with the requested authorization an amendment to the adopted Budgets that will hold the cumulative fund balance of the School District to the level projected at the time of the initial budget adoption or any subsequent amendment thereto.

**WHEREAS,** The School Reform Commission of the School District of Philadelphia at its meeting of May 26, 2016 (SRC-2) adopted a Capital Budget in the amount of \$172,742,291 for the Fiscal year 2017 and a Six Year Program for the Fiscal Years 2017-2022 in the amount of \$1,127,928,536, and

**WHEREAS,** Additional adjustments to reflect the variance between budgets and actual contract awards, the implementation of the reprioritization and revised estimated costs have been prepared; now, therefore be it

**RESOLVED,** That the Amended Capital Budget for Fiscal Year 2017 be adopted in the amount of \$120,345,758, and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Amended Six-Year Capital Program for Fiscal Years 2017-2022 as set forth in the summary exhibit be adopted in the amount of \$1,262,656,420, and

**WHEREAS,** Section 12-304 of the Home Rule Charter requires the School District to adopt a Capital Program which is comprised of a Capital Budget for the ensuing fiscal year and capital expenditures planned for the ensuing five years no later than the date of adoption of the Operating Budget, and

**WHEREAS,** The Proposed Fiscal Year Budget and Program which was included in the May 26, 2016 (SRC-2) Budget Document has been adjusted to reflect project reprioritization, transfers and revised estimates; now, therefore be it

**RESOLVED,** That the Capital Budget for Fiscal Year 2018 be adopted in the amount of \$230,849,277, and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Proposed Six-Year Capital Program for Fiscal Years 2018-2023 as set forth in the Summary Exhibit be adopted in the amount of \$1,289,953,215, and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the individual projects included in the Adopted Fiscal Year 2017 and Fiscal Year 2018 Capital Budgets must be authorized by separate resolutions of the School Reform Commission prior to implementation

**WHEREAS**, the Philadelphia Intermediate Unit No. 26 adopted an Operating Budget on May 25, 2017, including appropriations for the Intermediate Unit for the Fiscal Year 2017-18, in the amount of \$389,600,894; now be it

**RESOLVED**, that the Board of Directors authorizes Philadelphia Intermediate Unit No. 26, through the Executive Director or his designee, to execute, deliver and perform an agreement with The School District of Philadelphia, for the School District to provide all professional and non-professional personnel services, all materials, supplies, books and equipment necessary for a complete educational program in Special Education Programs, Transportation for Special Education, and Auxiliary Services to Non-Public Students. All services provided by the School District will comply with applicable law and any decrees by a court of competent jurisdiction. The programs provided in conjunction with this contract will not exceed the following: Special Education - \$295,438,315, Transportation for Special Education - \$79,689,579, and Auxiliary Services to Non-Public School Students - \$14,473,000, for the period commencing July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018.
