Kelsey Romano suggested we read the recent article (linked below) "Philadelphia Teacher Faces 65 Years in Prison After Another Person Torched a Police Car During a Protest" by Rachel Cohen on December 9, 2020 in *The Appea*l.

Kelsey writes:

Anthony Smith is not only a beloved member of his school, but a leader in our community. He has worked tirelessly fighting for a better future for his students and Philadelphia as a whole. Philadelphia also has teachers that do not reflect the population we teach. 70% of teachers are White and only 23% of teachers are Black (with an even smaller percentage of that being Black men teachers).

It isn't surprising to me (a White, cis, woman teacher who was also arrested for peacefully protesting) that I was released and my fine dismissed, but Anthony Smith (a strong, outspoken Black man) was only recently released from prison in spite of the lack of evidence against him.

We must stand in solidarity with Ant. His fight is far from over. #freeant
